

## SENATE PASSES THE TARIFF BILL

Ten Republicans Voted Against Measure and Only One Democrat for It.

CONTAINS 400 PARAGRAPHS.

Eight Hundred and Forty Amendments Were Added to House Bill—To be Sent to Conference.

Washington, July 8.—The tariff bill passed the senate just after 11 o'clock tonight by a vote of 45 to 24. Republicans voting in the negative were: Beveridge (Ind.), Bristow (Kan.), Brown (Neb.), Burkett (Neb.), Clapp (Minn.), Crawford (S. D.), Cummings (Iowa), Dooliver (Iowa), La Follette (Wis.), Nelson (Minn.).

McEnery of Louisiana was the only Democrat voting in the affirmative.

voice vote. This is practically the same provision as that which passed the house. It removes the tax of six cents a pound on the tobacco grower and is supposed to have been the cause of the night-ride attacks in Kentucky and Tennessee. There is little doubt that the provision will remain in the bill.

The tobacco tax schedule as a whole was adopted by the senate.

An amendment proposed by Senator Curtis of Kansas, providing for a countervailing duty on crude oil from any country imposing a duty on American oil, was adopted by a vote of 14 to 31.

Senator Burton said the purpose of the amendment was to prevent oil coming in free from Mexico, where, he said, the Standard Oil company had three refineries.

Senator Gore offered an amendment providing that importers of crude petroleum should be subject to the drawback provision of the tariff bill.

Senator Aldrich and Senator Curtis promptly accepting this provision, it was made a part of the amendment offered by Mr. Curtis.

The Curtis amendment was then agreed to.

Mr. Stone offered an amendment placing hides, leather and shoes on the free list. It was, on motion of Mr. Aldrich, laid on the table.

An amendment by Mr. Newlands, creating a tariff commission, the adoption of which he urged in an extended speech, was laid on the table.

Advocating the placing of crude asphalt on the free list, Mr. Burton said such action would reduce from 5 to 15 per cent the cost of asphalt paving.

This proposition was opposed by Senator Flint, who declared that free asphalt would be a further strengthening of the asphalt trust.

"Is there an asphalt trust?" inquired Mr. Bailey.

"Yes," retorted Mr. Flint.

"Please say that loud enough for the attorney-general to hear it," appealed the Texan.

Mr. Burton obtained an aye and no vote on his amendment, and it was rejected, 37 to 29.

NIGHT SESSION.

When, at 6 o'clock, it became known that Senators La Follette, Beveridge, Brandegee and others had speeches which they desired to deliver before the final disposition of the bill, it became very evident that there would be a night session, and many predicted that the hour would be late before the final touches could be placed upon the measure.

After the disposal of the tobacco and oil provision, it was discovered that many other senators were prepared to present amendments.

An amendment by Mr. Dixon of Montana, raising the exemption clause of the inheritance tax; an amendment by Mr. McLaurin placing farmers' implements on the free list, and an amendment by Mr. Beveridge, creating an imperative drawback provision of the tariff on tin plate, were successively laid on the table.

Mr. Beveridge explained in championing his amendment, that the Standard Oil company, during a period of 12 years, had paid \$20,000,000 in duties on tin plate and afterwards upon making it into oil cans for export had received that vast amount as a drawback.

"I do not offer this amendment because of prejudice against the Standard Oil company, or because of its unpopularity," explained Mr. Beveridge. He was moved to take this action, he said, purely as a measure of protection to promote the tin plate industry.

The United Steel company are the only people who make tin plate in the United States," said Mr. Aldrich, upon moving to lay the amendment on the table. Oil was not the only article exported in tin cans, he said. Meats or the west, fish, fruits and vegetables were sent abroad that way.

DELUGE OF AMENDMENTS.

A deluge of proposed amendments came from Republicans and Democrats, the while with automatic regularity, Mr. Aldrich caused them to be laid on the table. It appeared that senators were practically fighting over in the senate all of the issues that had been contested while the bill was in committee of the whole.

Efforts of senators were successful in obtaining increases of duty on salicylic acid from 5 to 10 cents a pound; on steel sheets from 2-10 to 3-10 of one cent a pound, and a duty of 35 per cent on valvulose on nickel sheet strips and wire. Arsenic was taken from the free list and a duty of 2 cents a pound was placed upon it.

Senator Bristow's amendment to eliminate the consular duty on the sugar schedule was laid on the table, after he had spoken in its advocacy.

A duty of 2½ cents a pound was placed on licorice; on orange oil, a rate of 20 per cent ad valorem; and on lime the present rate of 5 cents per 100 pounds was doubled.

Mr. Gore delivered a final denunciation of the entire system of protection as existing in the bill. He compared Mr. Aldrich to the shepherd of a hungry flock, saying that his lambs had all been tamed until they would eat out of the hand.

Said he: "Mary had one lamb, and it followed her to school one day; the chairman of the finance committee has fifty lambs, and they follow him every day."

Suggesting that the president should promptly veto the tariff bill in fairness to his campaign pledge, Mr. Gore said: "It might not be so far reaching in prophecy to say that the next president of the United States may be an 'African.'"

This adroit reference to Mr. Roosevelt was received with laughter.

PROMISES NOT KEPT.

The failure of the senate to keep the promise made to the people by the Republican party respecting a revision of the tariff downward, was the theme of Senator Beveridge as the debate on the pending bill was drawing to a close.

"Our votes," he said, "shall be cast in harmony with our party's pledges as voiced by our party's leader and the national president."

Suggesting that the "insurgents" would cast their votes on the final passage of the bill in conformity with their previous action, Mr. Beveridge said they would do so, as a notice to the conference to bring back a bill in which there should be decreases of duties.

Mr. Beveridge was answered by Mr. Aldrich, who said he had often seen men interpret their own judgment as the judgment of the party.

"The Republican party is a party of majorities," he added, "and the views of the majority in matters of legislation control party policies. The senator from Iowa does not speak for the Republican party. He has no right to call here the name of the president of the United States in support of any suggestion which he has made."

Mr. Aldrich declared that the pending bill was a fulfillment of the party's pledges. If senators wished to vote against the bill, he said, they should not vote at all.

"I have listened with deep interest to

the fearful and prophetic funeral oration," said Mr. Stone, from the Democratic side of the chamber. He declared it reminded him of the old hymn, "Hark, from the Tomb a Doleful Sound."

Mr. Crawford delivered a vigorous protest against any attempt on the part of Chairman Aldrich to prevent Republican senators from the exercise of their judgment.

"It will take more than the senator from Rhode Island to read the state of Minnesota out of the Republican party," said Mr. Nelson, amid applause, which called down the gravel of the vice-president with an announcement that such expressions were not permitted. He said he did not care to be lectured by the senator from Rhode Island.

The bill was then put on its passage and passed, 45 to 24.

Upon motion of Mr. Aldrich, the vice president announced the senate conference as follows:

Senators: Aldrich, Burrows, Penrose, Hale, Gullion, Republicans: Daniel, Money and Bailey, Democrats.

The senate then adjourned at 11:18.

TO BE SENT TO CONFERENCE.

Washington, July 8.—There will be no delay in sending the tariff bill to conference after it reaches the house. It is expected that the bill will be sent to that body by the senate late tomorrow. The house will meet daily from now until the end of the session.

As soon as the bill is received Mr. Daizell is expected to offer a resolution by which the house will disagree to the senate amendments on bloc and agree to the conference. If there is any disposition to debate the resolution, Representative Payne of New York will probably move the previous question on the resolution, thereby putting off discussion.

When Mr. Daizell's resolution is adopted the speaker will announce the list of conferees.

It is likely that the first thing agreed to in conference will be reductions on necessities of life and raw materials made in the house bill by the senate. The increases made by the senate on certain luxuries will probably offer a temporary barrier to an early agreement in conference because of the contention that these increased rates will prove prohibitive and will materially reduce the revenue.

Panama, July 8.—Mail advices received from Colombia report a critical

quilla, so that the revolutionists will not lack for funds.
