Efforts of senators were successful in obtaining increases of duty on salicylic

bilinity of senators were successful in obtaining increases of duty on salicylic acid from 5 to 10 cents a pound; on steel sheets from 2-10 to 3-10 of one cent a pound, and a duty of 35 per cent ad valorem on nickel sheet strips and wire. Arsenic was taken from the free list and a duty of 2 cents a pound was placed upon if

free list and a duty of 2 cents a pound was placed upon it. Senator Bristow's amendment to eliminate the color standard in the sugar schedule was laid on the table, after he had spoken in its advocacy. A duty of 2½ cents a pound was placed on licorice; on orange oil, a rate of 50 per cent ad valorem, and on lime, the present rate of 5 cents per 100 pound: was doubled. Mr. Gore delivered a final denuncia-tion of the entire system of protection as exemplified in the bill. He com-pared Mr. Aldrich to the shepherd of a hungry flock, saying that his lambs had all been tamed until they would eat out of the hand.

PROMISES NOT KEPT. The failure of the senate to keep the promise made to the people by the Re-publican party respecting a revision of bublican party respecting a revision of the tariff downward, was the theme of Senator Beveridge as the debate on the pending bill was drawing to a close. "Our votes," he said, "shall be cast

Pending bill was drawing to a close. "Our votes," he said, "shall be cast in harmony with our party's pledges as voiced by our party's leader and the national president." Suggesting that the "insurgents" would cast their votes on the final pas-sage of the bill in conformity with their previous action, Mr. Beveridge said they would do so, as a notice to the conferees to bring back a bill in which there should be decreases of duties. Mr. Beveridge was answered by Mr. Aldrich, who said he had often seen men interpret their own judgment as the judgment of their party. "The Republican party is a party of majorities," he sciled, "and the views of the majority in matters of legisla-tion control party policies. The sen-ator from Indiana does not speak for the Republican party. He has no right to call here the name of the president of the United States in support of any suggestion which he has made." Mr. Aldrich declared that the pend-ing bill was a fulfulment of the presting.
