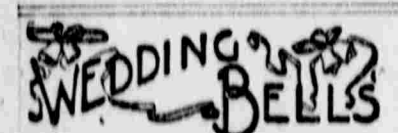

The only touch of extraneous trimming that is used is the ostrich plume at the side, this showing the modish frambos or raspberry shading; and a knot of supple white satin ribbon seems to hold the plume in place. The long tie strings start from the back and are supposed to be drawn loosely to the front and not tied.
