Fairview, New Mexico, April 26.-Thi place was settled in 1874 by M. E. Willis and brothers. We are located 28 miles north of Santa Fe, in a nice valley of the Rio Grande. We have a good climate, but it seems a matter of im-

possibility to get Latter-day Saints to stay here and be satisfied. We are entirely surrounded by a Mexican pop-ulation, whose ways and manner of living are entirely different from ours. They practise some very peculiar things and call it religion. It brings to mind some things we read of that happened in the dark ages.

Weather and Crop Bulletin for Week Ending April 28.

Bolse, Idaho, April 28 .- U. S. department of agriculture, Idaho section, climate and crop service, weather bureau. Comparatively high temperature with some cloudiness and occasional local showers characterized the weather at the beginning of the week; this was fol-lowed by several bright, warm days, with some frost at night except in ex-treme western sections. Snow in the

mountains melted rapidly, causing streams to rise. About the 26th oc-curred a change to much cooler weather, accompanied by light rain over most of the state; though this retaided crop growth materially, cloudiness a night prevented the occurrence of dam aging frosts.

Farm work progressed without in terruption throughout the week; irri-gation has been begun in the southvestern counties. CROPS.

Fruit-In southwestern valleys, bloom in peach, apricot and early cherry trees has advanced rapidly, and is extremely uil; prune and pear buds are opening und apple buds show color; strawberry plants are coming into bloom. In other parts of the state fruit buds are swell-ing, and the condition of trees and the continues excellent. Grain-Fall and early sown spring

grain has made good growth, and is re-ported in thriving condition. Seeding spring grain is progressing over the eastern and northern portions of the state, and is approaching completion in avored localities.

Grass-Range grass has made good growth over most of the state, though some of the lower ranges need rain, Alfalfa is growing rapidly, and other hay crops are starting well. Damage to meadows from the continued cold eather in February appears to have een confined to a few localities. There a scarcity of alfalfa seed in some

utheastern sections. Vegetables and gardens-Sugar beet lanting continues in eastern counties, ith soil conditions favorable. Early garden vegetables are making satisfac
