QUARANTINE TROUBLE. Resident of County Said to Have Violated Health Law.

G. W. Cunningham, residing at 804 east Thirteenth South street, is to have an opportunity to explain to the sheriff's office what he regards as the proper conduct for a person in quarantine. Cunningham lives next door to one of the worst cases of smallpox in the infected district of Mill Creek. He is a huxter of vegetables and is in the habit of making frequent trips to Salt Lake with vegetables for sale. Tues-day he returned to his home and found a quarantine flag on his house, and was told that it meant for him to stay it home with his family. However, he reidently did not consider the law on he subject as very obligatory, for yesterday morning he hitched up and came to the city as usual. Dr. T. G. Odell, deputy county health

commissioner, received word this morn ng of Cunningham's disregard of the quarantine law, and promptly referred the matter to the sheriff's office for investigation. Dr. Odell said today in relation to

the matter: "Cunningham's children have been playing with children next door, who are now the most seriously afflicted patients we have, and the quarantining of his family was absolutely necessary as a precaution to control the disease. The quarantine iaw is very strict, and it means that when a man is put under quarantine he is not to leave the premises. If the family is without support the law provides for its care, at the expense of the county, while under restraint. So far indications are that the spread of the disease in Mill Creek has been arrested. No new cases have developed in addition to those reported when quarantine regulations were first put into force." MR. HAVEMEYER COMING.
