## NOTABLE UTAH WOMEN.

In the subject of this sketch, Salt Lake possesses a musical artist whose vocal gifts and ability as a teacher have been recognized in the most flattering manner in the various places where their possessor has appeared. As Miss Kate Bridewell she created something of a furore in New Orleans, her native city, and afterward in Cincinnati, Boston, Chicago and Utah, she has added to the laurels there awarded her. Mrs. Anderson was born in New Orleans, and received her musical education there and in Cincinnati, Boston and Chicago, studying under Zekia Vigna in Cincinnati, Charles Adams in Boston, and Hans Bialka of Handel Hall in Chicago. While with the latter she competed for and won the diamond medal awarded for standing first in the class, and has since won other high distinctions. She was chosen to fill the place of supervisor of music in New Orleans, and took leading part in various operas, recitals and concerts, receiving the highest encomiums for her work from both public and press. Mrs. Anderson—then Miss Bridewell—came to Utah in 1890 as representative from her State to the Rocky Mountain carnival, held in Ogden in that year. She was there married to W. M. Anderson, and lived for six years in the Junction city, devoting herself to her art, and attracting much attention by her exceptional musical talent, one of the most successful of her entertainments being the representation of an opera from Longfellow's "Masque of Pandora, set to music from the grand operas by Mrs. Anderson herself. In 1896 she came to Salt Lake, where a flattering reception has met her every public effort. For one year Mrs. Anderson held the position of choir leader in the First Congregational church, and afterwards a similar position in the Methodist church, for the same length of time. She is at present leader of the choir in the Jewish synagogue, and conductor of the classes in music at the Gordon academy. Mrs. Anderson has also filled the position of principal of the Salt Lake School of Fine Arts and Conservatory of Music, the department of voice culture being under her special direction. In connection with her work in vocal training, Mrs. Anderson has invented a successful musical instrument called the "notaphone," which provides for the objective teaching of music—the invention being an elevated wire staff upon which are placed, as required, treble or bass clef, made of wood or wooden notes, rests and other musical signs, and underneath are steel bars or "phones," giving the sounds represented by the notes set upon the staff. The instrument has received the approval of leading local and other musicians, who believe that it is destined to prove an important aid to the teaching of music. Mrs. Anderson is a sister of the noted contralto, Miss Carrie Bridewell, one of the leading members of the Grau Opera company, and who, according to the predictions of various musical judges, is destined to take her place amongst the operatic stars of the country.
