ADMIRAL WISE INSTRUCTED.

I . is Told What to Do in San

Domingo.

Washington, Feb. 10 .-- Specific structions have been cabled Rear Ad-miral Wise, commanding the training squadron in Dominican waters, regarding the protection of American shipping interests there. The firing on lighters attempting to land a part of the cargo of the Clyde line steamer New York by a government gunboat as re-ported in cable dispatches published today has aroused indignation in official circles here and it was said at the navy department that the probable course action after such an outrage would be the seizure of the government gunboat by Admiral Wise, in which event it would probably be carried to Guantana.

League of American Sportsmen.

Columbus, O., Feb. 10.-The national convention of the League of American Sportsmen convened here today with del-egates from various states and Canada and Alaska present. Prosident G. S. Shields of New York, delivered his annual address. The most important work was the adoption of a resolution offered by A. C. Cooper of Oklahoma, asking Congresss to set aside certain government lands in Oklahoma as a government game propa-gating farm.

BALTIMORE WANTS UNITED STATES SOLDIERS

To Pollee Fire District - Committee Will Report in Favor of a Legislative Appropriation.

Baltimore, Feb. 10 .- At a meeting today a joint committee of the legislature called to confer with the mayor, board of public works and leading citizens it was unanimously agreed to report a bill today asking the United States government to servi soldiers to Baltimore to police the fire district. The committee will also report in fa-

vor of an immediate appropriation legislature. Mayor McLane said that he will appoint an emergency com-mittee of representative citizens to act as an advisory board to the municipal authorities.

Subject of a Lecture Delivered at the University of Utah."

The students of the University of Utah were addressed this morning by Chaplain Marvin of Fort Douglas, who

spoke to them on "Experiences in the Chinese Boxer Campaign of 1900. At the time of the outbreak Chap-lain Marvin was in the Philippines, but he was later assigned to the Ninth in-fantry under Col. Liscum, and ordered with his company to proceed post-haste to China, the seat of disturbance at that time. The speaker drew a map on the blackboard and proceeded to illus-trate his subject by pointing out the different places referred to. He spoke of the attack on Tien Tsin, by which 24 per cent of the Ninth infantry were killed, and explained that this disaster was due to the dangerous position occupled by the American troops. The city was surrounded by walls from 59 60 feet high and 30 feet wide and the American soldiers were ordered to the south wall, which gave the Chinese ev. ery opportunity to shoot them down. The city, however, was taken and after that the troops directed their attention to Pekin, the eight nations having armies there at the time, dividing the city among them and keeping guard

over the several portions thereof. The Russians guarded the north side, the French the west, the Japanese the east, the Americans the southwest corner, the English the southeast and the other troops other parts of the city. The cause of the war, said Chaplain Marvin, was not missionary interference, as many supposed, but the pub-lication by an English admiral of a

Council Committee and Management Go Over the Theater Together.

Iron staircase outside of building on east side from third cir-cle to ground. Fire escapes and new exits on west side of building. Automatic sprinkling apparatus on stage. Eliminating steps from side aisles, making them inclines, as in the center aisle. Improvement in circular stair-

case by addition of railings. It is estimated that the cost of the mprovements will be not less than \$12,500.
