St. Paul, Aug. 10 .- Following a visit o North Dakota, Labor Commissioner Williams of Minnesota says that 1,000 men will be lucky if they can find employment in the harvest fields.

"This thing of railroads asking for 15,000 and 20,000 men each year for har-vest work in North Dakota and Minnesota is a snare and a delusion," said Commissioner Williams. "It is flooding the country with a lot of hoboes. I rode from Fargo to Bismarck, and the wheat is burned almost to the roots.

Venezuela's Troubles Have Been Brought About by Combination of Nations.

USE OF FORCE IS CONDEMNED

Blockaders of Ports Paid Because of Dominance of Force-Country Is Paying Its Debts.

Caracas, Friday, Aug. 7, via Port of Spain, Trinidad, Aug. 10,-Deviating from his usual custom of not speaking for publication, President Castro granted an interview today to the Associated Press concerning Venezuela and her troubles with foreign powers which have recently been augmented by the exputsion from the republic of the Dutch minister, M. De Rues, "I am glad to give the Associated Press my opinion on this histori event," said President Castro. "I only wish everybody peace and harmony that exist

with the good commercial relations which small nations need. "If the powers will not fulfill the great idea that the great international tribunal shall decide disputes by arbi-tration and not by force, they commit suicide

suicide. "Reason would acquire prestige and force would not prevail today if, when the blockaders used force against us, friendly nations had adopted peaceful measures to settle the outstanding questions. The co-operation against us of these nations considered as friends completely destroyed the right of rea-son and placed all of them in the cate-gory of favoring force as a solution of difficulties. The question of the use of force in the collection of debts was carried before The Hague peace conference but we weak natione saved our rights there.

was carried before The Hague peace conference but we weak nations saved our rights there. "In spite of all, Venezuela will con-tinue in peaceful development because this question has been settled and pos-terior events are only incidents. "We at first paid the blockaders of our ports because of the dominance of force. The decision that terminated this state of affairs was that of the high Hague tribunal. Today Venezue-la punctually pays her debts and ful-fills all her obligations. "The American government neverthe-less broke friendly relations with us, but notwithstanding this fact, commer-cial relations between the United States and Venezuela continue the same as before the break occurred. The sev-erance of friendly relations between France and Venezuela has not altered the normal progress of this republic. "Both the American and French gov-ermments have made claims against

ernments have made claims against Venezuela which are being investigated. Consequently corporate interests of these countries have damaged us, I assume that an opportunity will be taken by their government to listen to our just claims against those interests, and that competent tribunals will decide the

New York Man May Succeed Roger

O'Mara as Receiver.

Pittsburg, Aug. 10.-The probability that some New York man may soon suc-ceed Detective Roger O'Mara, now serv-ing as receiver and custodian of the es-tate of Harry K. Thaw, is the proposi-

tion in the much-complicated case gen-erally discussed in Pitteburg tonight. This is based upon the provisions of the federal bankrutcy haw. It is admit-ted by all having a knowledge of this law that creditors have the right at thair first meeting to clect a trustee to take charge of all of the property of a peti-tuostee immediately supersedes any re-ceiver that may previously have been appointed by any other authority. Acting upon this provision, it is surmised that the creditors, a majority of whom are residents of New York, are likely to make a concerted move for one of their own selection to act as trustee.

DECREASE IN NEW YORK POSTOFFICE REVENUE

New York, Aug. 11 .- The financial

row Fork, Adg. 11. The Internation depression since last fall is responsible for a decrease of 6.54 per cent in the revenue of the New York postofice for the fiscal year ended June 30. The net revenue of the general post-office and stations for 12 months ended June 30, was \$11.815.187, compared with \$12.643.867 for 1907, or a loss of \$22.790, for the fiscal year \$828,729 for the fiscal year recently

Gross receipts for 1908 were \$18,369. 119, a gain over the preceding year of \$8,447. The cost of running the local office is on the increase. Expenses for 1908, aggregated \$6,753,981, an increase over the fiscal year 1907, of \$\$37,177.

Notwithstanding the hard times, there was an increase in the domestic

there was an increase in the domestic money order business. During 12 months ended June 30, domestic money orders issued numbered 1.110,065, with a value of \$12,098,592. Money sent through and received at the New York postoffice by the inter-national money order system shows an increase. Foreign money orders ag-gregating 49,926 were issued; having a total value of \$1,\$19,503, or 4.730 more orders and \$558,671 more than in 1967. International money orders naid
