LOCAL BRIEFS.

Carl A. Peterson, formerly of Sweden, and John Anderson, formerly of Norway, were admitted to citizenship by Judge Moore yesterday.

David Evans of this city has been elected president of the Bank of Venice of southern California, one of the most promising of the new cities of that part of the state. The bank is capitalized for \$50,000.

Indications point to the rebuilding of the county infirmary on the present site. The county commissioners have had the walls of the building, which was recently destroyed by fire, inspected by City Building Inspector Lewis, who reported that they are in good condition for reconstruction. The insurance companies which carried insurance on the building are adjusting the loss and paying the claims, and the commissioners will soon be ready to commence rebuilding.

Gov. Cutler has received a communication from Manager Spencer Clawson of the Utah exhibit at Portland, telling of the opening of the model concentrating mill on last Friday and also of the celebration of Pioneer day at the Utah building. Both events were very successful and attracted a large number of visitors to the Utah building. The festival band, which was furnished the music for Pioneer day, and punch was served to all of the visitors. On the punch-bowl was the inscription: "Drink to the prosperity of Utah on her natal day."

HEALTH OF CITY.

It is Exceptionally Good—Contagious Diseases Almost Wiped Out.

The public health of Salt Lake City in so far as the contagious diseases are concerned, is in an exceptionally good condition. The report of the board of health for the week closing today shows that there is practically no contagious disease in the city. Only one case of smallpox was reported during the week, and that patient is practically well now. It is believed that the quarantine hospital will be closed on Monday, as there is not enough smallpox in the city to warrant the expense of keeping it open at all.

All connected with the health department are to be commended for their faithful work in enforcing the sanitary and quarantine regulations of the board and ridding the city of contagion. It has been a number of years since the city was as free from the contagion of this season of the year as it is now. A summary of the weekly health report follows: The report for the week shows 35 births, 20 males and 15 females.

The deaths reported for the same period were 14, of which 7 were males and 7 females.

The contagious diseases reported are 1 smallpox, 1 diphtheria, 5 typhoid fever and 2 tuberculosis.
