THE CITY TAX LEY.

It Was Filed by the City Council Last Night at Six and a Half Mils.

HERINGTON DECIDES TO STAY OUT. His Resignation Accepted and C. P. Mason and Andrew Brizan Candidates to Succeed Him.

There was a special meeting of the City Council last night with most of the members present and President Macintosh in the chair. His business was, in brief, transacted as follows: It was ordered that \$250 be paid as full compensation to Ebenezer Leiby for damage done to his property by delay in completing the gravity sewer. A bill for an ordinance to regulate, license, restrain and prohibit slaughter, houses, butchers and dealers in fresh meats, was referred to the committee on municipal laws and the city attorney associated.

The bill provides that all slaughterhouses or butcheries shall pay a yearly license of \$25, that the wholesale or commission houses handling fresh meats whose sales amount to \$10,000 or less per month shall pay \$100 license per year. For sales of over \$10,000 and less than \$20,000 per month, \$100 per year; for sales of over \$20,000 and less than \$50,000 per month \$200 per year; for all retail dealers in fresh meats whose sales amount to \$1,000 per month or less \$50 per year; for sales of over \$1,000 and less than \$5,000 per month, \$75 per year; for sales of over \$5,000 and less than \$10,000 per month, \$125 per year; for sales of over \$10,000 per month, \$150 per year.
