# THE COUNTY'S POOR.

### What it Cost to Keep Them During January-How Distributed.

Pauper Clerk James Sabine of the board of county commissioners reports that the sum of \$1,952.15 was paid out during the month of January in aiding the indigent of the county. Of that amount \$1,590.20 was paid for coal, groceries and clothing, and \$301.95 was paid for rents and railroad fares. A total of 223 families or 1.025 persons received aid from the county during the month. Of that number, 289 families or 916 per-Of that number, 259 families of 916 per-sons lived inside the city limits and 34 families or 109 persons resided in the county outside the city limits. The amount given to each family averaged \$6.07 and the amount per person was \$1.85. The county paid out \$134.30 less

He pointed to the congregation as wit-He pointed to the congregation as wit-nesses to the fulfillment of that por-tion of the revelation as follows:

1. The ends of the earth shall en-quire after thy name, and fools shall have thee in derision, and hell shall

rage against thee. 2. While the pure in heart, and the wise, and the noble, and the virtuous, shall seek counsel, and authority, and blessings constantly from under thy hand.

And thy people shall never be turned against thee by traitors. The name of Joseph Smith, said the speaker, is spoken for good or evil in speaker, is spoken for good or evil in all the world today, and every blessing we have received in the Gospel can be traced back to the Prophet. Have you received the Pristhood by ordination as a High Priest. Seventy or

Elder? If you can not trace the line of authority back to the Prophet Joseph, it is of small value to you. The ordinances of the temple were given to the Church by Joseph Smith, and he it was, and not Brigham Young, who revealed the endowments as at present administered. In fact, the authority to officiate in any or all the ordinances of the Gospel came from Joseph Smith.

But that which particularly impress-ed the speaker with regard to the foregoing revelation was the fact that God should condescend to take notice of and speak to this man who had been cast with the learned and influential and prominent people of his day. Yet the Lord deigned to speak to him

This, said Elder Clawson, is not the only evidence of God's favor to Joseph Smith, for he said to him upon an-other occasion, namely, in section 132, July 12, 1843, verse 49: "For I am the Lord thy God, and will be with these even unto the end of the world, and through all eternity; for verily, I seal upon you your exaltation, and prepare a throne for you in the kingdom of my Father, with Abraham your father." It would seem from these wonderful and impressive words of revelation, that Joseph is to sit upon a throne of power with Abraham. his father, Who was abraham? Why he was designated in the Holy Scriptures, as the father of the faithful, and a triend of God. What an honor to be called the friend of God and what a distinction for Jo-seph Smith to sit with that friend in the kingdom of the Father."
