Ernest L. Godbe Makes Flying Trip to Southern Camp.

Ernest L. Godbe Makes Flying Trip to Southern Camp. Ernest L. Godbe, mine manager of the Ohlo-Kentucky and Prince Consol-idated mines at Pioche, has returned from camp. He made a flying trip, having left Salt Lake on Tuesday on the Los Angles fimited and returned early this morning. "I couldn't have done this well," said Mr. Godbe, "if I had not gone over-land from Caliente. I arrived in Pioche about 11 o'clock Wednesday forenoon, notwithstanding a heavy rain had made the roads heavy, whereas if I had waited for the Pioche train, the desti-nation would not have been reached until 8 o'clock at night. As it was I had three or four hours to attend to and started back home." There has been a good deal of com-plaint from travelers into the Pioche district of late about the train ser-vice from Salt Lake, and, just as Mr. Godbe stated, there is no way of mak-ing a short trip unless the overland drive is made from Caliente. Direct connections are made to Pioche with trains from the west: but Salt Lake, which not only supplies the bulk of travel to the Pioche branch as well as a big freight business, gets the worst end of it under the schedule in force at the present time. No matter whether a person leaves Salt Lake on the lim-ited train in the evening, or on the slow train at night, there is no way of avoiding a lay-over at Caliente.
