R. Hall McCormick Goes from Chi-

cago to New York in Her. New York, Aug. 17 .-- R. Hall McCor-mick of Chicago has arrived here on board his yacht Rapidan, after a month's cruise through theGreat Lakes, the St. Lawrence river and the At-

antic ocean. Yachting men say that the cruise of the Rapidan is the first voyage by the lake route which has ever been made by a private Chicago built yacht. Mr. Mc Cormick left Chicago with his family on July 8 for Buffalo by way of Lakes

Michigan, Huron and Erie. At Buffa-lo Mr. McCormick visited the Pan-Amercan exposition. Then proceeding by way of the Erie canal and Lake Ontario the party spent considerable time among the Thousand islands. The yacht reached the Atlantic ocean by the St. Lawrence river and the Canadian canals. Leaving the mouth of the St. Lawrence the Rapidan made good time along the Atlantic seaboard to Boston and through Long Island sound

Sixty Teachers Bound for Philip pines Get Married at Honolnlu.

The teachers had been selected from the many normal universities of the country and were all strangers to each other. Their acquaintanceship and courtship extended over a period of ess than ten days.
