

WAS CLEVELAND LETTER A FORGERY?

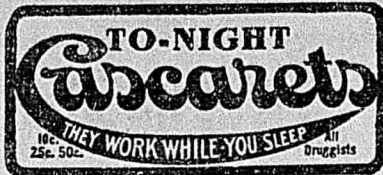
Broughton Brandenburg Who
Sold it is Placed Under
Arrest.

HE PUTS FORTH STATEMENT.

Asks if it is Reasonable That for
Paltry Sum Same Man Would Falsify
Utterances of Ex-President.

Dayton, O., Oct. 22.—As he was boarding a train for New York City here this afternoon, Broughton Brandenburg was arrested by local detectives on the charge of forgery and grand larceny. A telegram from the New York city police department advised the local department to hold him. He is alleged to have sold to the New York Times a letter which he alleged was written by Grover Cleveland in which the dead statesman predicted the election of Taft, and which letter is now declared to have been a forgery.

Brandenburg was locked up, as the amount of his bail was not fixed. In a statement issued tonight Brand-



enburg says he had the proper authority from Mrs. Cleveland and from Mr. Hastings, co-executor of the Cleveland will, before he sold the article to the Times, and furthermore asks if it is reasonable to suppose that any sane man would falsify the utterances of an ex-president of the United States for \$120? At the time he was arrested he said he was on his way to New York city to give Dist. Atty. Jerome additional evidence. He says the arrest was made by those interested in effecting the influence of Mr. Cleveland's utterances, the object being "to secure a dramatic climax just before election."

Through his attorney, Brandenburg issued the following statement:

"It appears that I am to be the Capt. Dreyfus of the campaign of 1908. I have been peculiarly alone and left alone in my fight, and though ready to welcome the great body of support which the facts warrant me in believing will come, if it does not come I shall go on alone."

"Is it reasonable that for the sake of \$120, that would have been my profit after weeks of work, any sane man in my position would have falsified the utterances of an ex-president of the United States? Is it reasonable when persons had seen the handwriting in my possession in March, that when I presented the scheme for the three articles for sale in March, and when I signed the paper authorizing from Mrs. Cleveland and the co-executor, Mr. Hastings, before I sold the single article, that there could have been anything but fair dealing in my conduct? Why was the alleged evidence that the document was fraudulent not produced when the document was challenged, and why has it never

been produced save in the secrets of the grand jury room, when the American public is entitled to know every scrap of evidence in the matter at once? Why have my witnesses been intimidated? Why is indictment found, if one has been found, before my case is in? Yesterday I wired Dist. Atty. Jerome that I had new evidence to produce on Friday, and as I stepped aboard the train for New York to fulfill my agreement I am arrested as a fugitive from justice, though my attorney Joseph Williams and myself informed the district attorney of my purposes and destination on this journey."

"This allows those who are interested in offsetting the influence of Mr. Cleveland's utterances to secure a dramatic climax just before election. The entire matter in all fittingly with Col. Vatterson's plan, announced before the article was published, that it must be discarded by any means, it remains to be seen if the American public is to be bulldozed on one hand while I am victimized on the other."

Habeas corpus proceedings are now being brought.

HERMANN'S TRIAL POSTPONED.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 22.—The trial of former Congressman Binker Hermann, indicted in connection with the Oregon land frauds, has been again postponed, and this time indefinitely, or at least until the attorneys in the case come together at some indefinite time and decide on a date for trial. Assistant Atty.-Gen. Francis C. Ducker announced in an off-setting the influence of Mr. Hermann's trial was Nov. 3, but owing to the absence of Judge Hunt, before whom many of the trials had been held, and because F. J. Heney, who was expected to conduct the prosecution of the case, could not come, that an arrest had been reached among the attorneys to postpone the trial until such time as Hunt and Heney could come to Portland. The postponement of the case of former Congressman J. N. Williamson and application of former United States Dist. Atty. J. H. Hall for a new trial will also be postponed.

GREAT COMMERCIAL LAKE HARBOR AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Oct. 22.—The first definite proposal for the creation of a great commercial lake harbor along Chicago's water front was made to Mayor Busse yesterday by the Furniture Exposition company. This concern desires to build a deepwater harbor off the lake front immediately north of the mouth of the Chicago river. With its docks and slips the work is estimated to cost \$8,000,000.

The harbor is intended to accommodate both passenger and freight lake traffic. The plans provide for the extension of street car service along the docks to the gangways of the steamers, while a lighterage system is designed to handle the merchandise.

If the proposal meets with approval from the city administration the council will be asked to cooperate with the company in securing from the state legislature the necessary authority to construct the docks. The proposed grant will provide that the docks will become the property of the city at the end of 20 years.

The original band of six sisters has increased until the community now has an enrollment of nearly 1,000 members who are found in mission schools in nearly every state in the Union.
