

engineer not missing Callay till arriving there. The engineer immediately returned to American Fork and found Callay at the end of the platform, in front of the station, dead, having been dragged some little distance by the cars.

From the best information we can gain we understand that Brother Callay had told the engineer not to stop at American Fork, but to slow the train there and pass along to Lehi. The unfortunate young man must have been killed instantaneously, as several persons who slept all night upon the platform did not hear him make any noise and knew nothing of the accident till after the return of Mr. John Warwood, the engineer, and the body was found.

We also learn that an inquest was held over the remains at American Fork, after which they were conveyed to Lehi, where his parents reside, who were fearfully distressed on learning of the fate of their son.

Brother Callay was about twenty-five years of age, a native of France, and came to this Territory about five or six years ago. He was universally respected for his gentlemanly and courteous deportment, as well as general good character, and he was esteemed, by the company in whose employ he was, as one of the most steady, active and reliable servants on the line.

A number of the officers and employees of the company, including Messrs. Jennings, Little, and Sharp, went from the City and different points along the line to Lehi to-day for the purpose of being present at the funeral, which was to take place at 6 o'clock this evening.

DISCOURSE

BY

PRESIDENT BRIGHAM YOUNG,

DELIVERED IN

The Bowery, at Brigham City,
Saturday Morning,
June 26, 1874.

REPORTED BY DAVID W. EVANS.

A FEW of us have come to talk to the people in this place upon the things of the kingdom of God, as our calling is to preach the gospel, initiate people into, and proceed with, the organization of the kingdom of God as far as we can, preparatory to the coming of the Son of Man. We have commenced to organize, I will say partially, in the Holy Order that God has established for his people in all ages of the world when he has had a kingdom upon the earth. We may call it the Order of Enoch, the Order of Joseph, the Order of Peter, or Abraham, or Moses, and then go back to Noah, and then step to our own position here, and say that we will organize as far as we have the privilege, taking into consideration and acting under the laws of the land. Many branches of industry have been organized here to help to sustain each other, to labor for the good of all, and to establish co-operation in the midst of the church in this place.

In most of the business transactions of this church and people, as far as I have directed, I have waited for business to be presented, and endeavored to so live that the Lord will dictate according to his own mind and pleasure, and, at the very time it is necessary, have that knowledge which will enable us to perform every labor acceptably to God and to the heavens, and to discharge our duties one to another, and to accomplish in every particular the work which our Father in heaven has given us to do. I am a minute-man. It is very seldom that I take thought what I shall say or what I shall do. When we meet in the capacity of a conference, the business matters are presented, and I generally know what to do, and I do not know but what I understand the workings of the kingdom of God upon the earth, by the manifestations of the Spirit at the moment, as well as I should if I had studied them for months; and I can truly say that I have fulfilled one of the sayings of the Savior tolerably well—to take no thought what ye shall say, for in the very hour or moment when you need it, it shall be given to you.

I hope that, during our meetings here, the people will be edified and comforted, and that the system of laboring together for each other's good will be wisely and satisfactorily laid before them, and that each and every one of us, with ready minds and willing hearts, will proceed to do the things that are required of us by our heavenly Father.

Much can be said upon the doctrine of life and salvation, but I will say this to the Saints in this place concerning the workings of the kingdom of God upon the earth—all good comes from heaven, all good is of the Lord; whatever promotes the happiness of mankind and the glory of God, whatever increases peace and righteousness upon the earth, and leads the people in the way of godliness, comfort, contentment and enjoyment, and tends to increase health and wealth, and life here and hereafter, is of God; and, in laboring for each other's welfare and happiness, if we can not do all that we want to do, let us do

what we can, and leave the event with the Lord, and wait for the time when we can fully enter into the organization of the kingdom of God upon the earth; and fully upon those initiatory steps which will hasten the perfection of the Saints, and prepare them to enter into the joy of their Lord. When we are permitted to do in part, we will step forward and do in part, go as far as we can, and do as much as we can to perfect ourselves and prepare for the building up of the centre stake of Zion.

We hope and pray that all who may speak during our meetings here will be filled with the Spirit of the Lord; and that those who pray, sing and hear may be filled with the same spirit, that we may increase in knowledge and wisdom and grow in the things of God. This is what we desire and what we pray for, and we hope that our meetings will be profitable to all.

This is a hard place to speak in and we request the brethren and sisters to be as still as they conveniently can, so that they can hear what is said. Let all be quiet, and every heart be lifted to God; that we may learn his mind and will concerning us; then ask for power to do his will, for a disposition to give us victory over every passion and slothful feeling, that we may be awake to righteousness.

Salvation and life everlasting are before us; it is our business to secure them in the kingdom of our God, and to prepare for the restoration of the inhabitants of the earth who have slept without the gospel. Let us do what we can to bless ourselves, our posterity and our progenitors, and to save the human family, and so fulfill the mission which the Lord has given us.

AMERICAN.

WASHINGTON, 9.—Patents have been forwarded to the Surveyor General of California for the following private land claims: The undivided half of the ranches Los Dolsas, in Los Angeles county, Ramoa Yorka et al confirmees; part of the rancho San Antonio, in Alameda county, for 15,206 acres, Antonio Paralta confirmee. The survey has been received at the general land office of the rancho La Undivided, for 8,642 acres, in Monterey county, Ramon Butron et al confirmees; also from the recorder of land titles at St. Louis, Mo., the claim of Lawrence Sango, filed under the act of June 22, 1860 and approved by the recorders.

The Secretary of War, to-day, received a letter from Governor Davis of Minnesota, in behalf of the people suffering from the grasshopper and locust scourge, in the southwestern part of the State. It says that all the resources of the State have been strained to aid them, and asks that \$8,160, the estimated worth of the two years' quota of arms now due the State, may be served out in rations in lieu thereof. Chief clerk Crosby forwarded a telegram to Secretary Belknap, at New London, with his endorsement. There appears to be no authority in law for diverting an appropriation from its proper source, even in cases of emergency.

The war department, to-day, received dispatches confirming the accounts of a battle with the Sioux in Nebraska; Lieut. Young is reported dangerously wounded. Reports from Captain Joseph Bush, in the lower part of Dakota, and from Captain Carlisle Boyd, at the Cheyenne agency, state that the Indians are in a warlike mood, and may break out in depredations before long. Col. John E. Smith, of the 14th Infantry, writes from Camp Robeson, Neb., June 22nd, that Indians who have arrived there report large war parties destined for various parts of Nebraska. General Ruggles, assistant adjutant general of the department of the Platte, in forwarding a dispatch, says the department commander has been notified of a movement by these Indians, and that steps have been taken to intercept them.

The interior department gives a decision that after a homesteader has completed his term of five years, further residence is not required to entitle him to a patent; also that a residence in a double house built on the dividing line between adjoining homesteads, is a residence in compliance with the law.

NORFOLK, Va., 9.—The mai and express car attached to the eastward bound train, on the Atlantic, Mississippi and Ohio road, was burned with a large mail and much express matter this afternoon, near Petersburg; route agents Jones and Jennings were severely burned in attempting to put out the flames. They were unable to communicate, the bell rope having been burned, and finally jumped from the car. The origin of the fire is unknown.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., 9.—The cable ship Faraday arrived safely this afternoon, all right, having been detained several days by fogs; the Ambassador is expected to return here immediately, when the cable will be laid forthwith.

CLEVELAND, O., 9.—Five highwaymen, last night, robbed Jackson Harrison of four thousand dollars after he had left the street car near East Cleveland; they then gagged and bound and left him. He was found this morning.

BALTIMORE, 9.—The dead body of a man was discovered to-day in a sink attached to the house of the superintendent of Patterson Park; upon being taken out and examined it was identified as the body of C. Hall, an employee of the Howe Sewing Machine Co., in this city. About a week ago a suit of clothes was found in a music stand at Patterson Park, and the papers found in the pocket showed them to be the clothing of Hall, since which time he has been missing. The body found to-day was entirely nude, and much decomposed; an investigation of the case will be held to-morrow.
