THE BOULEVARD AGAIN.

Lawson offered the following:

Resolved, That it be the sense of the City Council present that the city shall build the proposed boulevard from Capitol Hill into City Creek canyon and out on to the north bench as contemplated by the city engineer, when the citizens give to the Council proper assurance that they will build the remainder of said boulevard from the north bench at City Creek canyon via Fort Douglas and Thirteenth East street to Twelfth South street on such route and in such manner as may be hereafter approved by the City Council.

Adopted.

SEWER MAIN CONNECTIONS.

Moran offered the following:

Resolved, That the property owners on Brigham street be notified to make connections with the sewer main on Brigham street immediately where the sewer main is now laid.

Folland raised the point that the resolution was illegal as there was no such street as "Brigham." The resolution was, however, adopted.

The committee on waterworks reported that the following bids had been received for the furnishing of 281 hydrants and valves according to specifications:

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT.

The following report by Superintendent Millsbaugh was read, recorded and filed:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor formally to report the opening of the Hamilton school on Monday, March 6 h. The building as now completed consists of eight class rooms, two recitation rooms and principal's office. Its capacity on the basis of fifty pupils to the room is, therefore, 400 pupils. On the opening morning there were 444 pupils, representing all of the eight grades.

The third grade was found to number 106 pupils and required two rooms. The sixth, seventh and eighth grades were placed in one room, although this was done at the cost of considerable crowding of desks.

New pupils have been added to the enrollment each day since the opening, and a few have been returned to the schools from which they came. As early as Monday it was apparent that there must be room furnished for all the pupils that were seeking admission. On Tuesday arrangements were made for temporarily reopening one of the rooms in the old buildings to furnish relief for the over-crowded second and fourth grades. On Wednesday morning accordingly this room was occupied, making a total of nine classrooms for the school. In several of the rooms extra seats have been placed, and all are filled. But I believe that we shall now be able to get

along quite well, until the completion of the two ground floor rooms.

Following is a statement which gives the number of pupils in the school today and the sources from which they were drawn: Old Fort school, 186; old Second school, 105; Tenth school, 92; Fourteenth school, 9; Seventh school, 1; Twenty-first school, 1; South Lawn, 1; Bryant school, 5; Third school, 9; Eighth school, 1; Eighteenth school, 2; not enrolled in any other public school this year, original entries, 44; total, 455.

The number of original entries is thus seen to be nearly 10 per cent of the entire enrollment. The proportion of original entries at the Lowell school was considerably larger than this, amounting to about 16 per cent.

These statements are interesting as indicating the effect upon the public mind of the existence in the vicinity of large, beautiful, attractive school buildings.

Room 5, Miss Hadley, third grade; Room 6, Miss Burch, B fourth grade; Room 7, Miss Haight, fifth grade; Room 8, Mrs. Suydam, sixth, seventh and eighth grades; Otis building, Mrs. Hickey, A second and B third; Elizabeth Qualtrough, principal.

The report was filed.

HEATING AND VENTILATING BIDS.

The committee on sites and buildings, to whom was referred the matter of securing bids for heating and ventilating the Oquirrh school building, reported: Smead Warming & Ventilating company, \$5000; Midgley & Sons company, \$5386; Heesch, Davies & company, \$5725; P. J. Moran, \$5835. The committee recommended the acceptance of Mr. Moran's bid, but after a long discussion the name of Heesch, Davies and company was substituted in a minority report for that of Midgley & Sons.

ASSIGNMENTS.

The committee also reported that the assignment on August 3rd, 1892, by F. M. Wright in favor of Bothwell & McConaughy, was filed with the clerk of the board on January 14th, and recommended that all payments due to Mr. Wright be paid in accordance with the said assignment; that the same action be taken in the assignment of of Crox ord Bros. & Bryan in favor of Mason & Co; that all contractors of the several school buildings be required to furnish the clerk of the board with a list of all sub-contractors that they may have the amounts of said contracts and the sums paid thereon, and that a copy of same be furnished the superintendent of buildings.
