By pound-ing and mixing with water, and straining, a beverage almost precisely similar to the sweetest and richest (cow's) milk may be obtained. Cream even separates from this milk, which may be converted into butter. Thus almond orchards would efford a superior supply of milk, cream and butter "Ree's Cylclopedia," in a recipe, gives the proportion as one ounce of almonds to a quart of water. As the trees, fully grown, average twenty pounds per tree, half of which we may estimate as shell, we may expect 160 quarts of milk to each tree. In nutritions properties it is said by chemists to be fully equal to cow's milk, and fine medical properties, being a valu-able remedy for heartburn, acidity, etc. It
