Montana Asks Admission as a State.

Senate.

WASHINGTON, 18.—Sherman resumed the chair to-day.

Among the petitions presented and referred was one by Col. John C. Frémont, of El Paso, Texas, complaining of smuggling on the Mexican border and urging Congress to take measures to stop it.

Also, by Doph and Mitchell, memorials of the Legislature of Oregon, praying Congress to make appropriations for the improvement of the Columbia River and the establishment of a public park in Oregon.

By Senator Dawes.—To reimburse the Territories for monies expended in the prosecution of Indians for crimes, also to grant lands in several tracts to the Mono-Yokayo Reservation, California. (The two bills are copies of drafts submitted to Congress by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.)

By General Stanford.—To relinquish the interest of the United States in certain lands granted San Francisco on March 20, 1853, to the city and county of San Francisco, and to private individuals confirming title to private land claims in Arizona known as "San Juan Land Grants." (Signed by Gen. Rafael del Valle, "San Jose de Sonora," "Los Nogales de Elias" and "Tres Alamos" claims.)

Also, by Edmunds, reports submitted from the committee on Indian Affairs, which the committee was one in, calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury to investigate the subject of the regulation of coinage rates on rail-road and water routes.

With the report Culom presented a bill regulating later State coinage, which he asked might be referred back to the committee of which the committee continued.

The request was granted and a resolution was passed ordering the committee to report the bill, and the committee's report and the testimony before it.

Indians proposed a resolution threatening the Secretary of the Treasury to inform the Senate what proportion of the ten million dollars of the United States coinage fund was to be paid out on February 1, 1866, as a basis for circulation, and how much by each of such banks.

Edmunds inquired whether Ingalls thought the Senate had any right to call on the Secretary of the Treasury for any information. "I have seen it in the leading newspapers," Edmunds remarked.
