**The Appointment of Ambassadors to State.**

**WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 3.—**—J. A. Lee, U. S. Ambassador to Italy, has respectfully declined to accept the appointment, and in spite of the President's request that he reconsider his determination, he firmly declines. The correspondence will be published in the *Evening Star*.

**NEW YORK, November 20th.** Van Alen writes to Secretary Gresham, acknowledging the great honor conferred, but after serious and careful reflection, decides to not accept. In his letter he says: "I am sorry to inform you that he refused the appointment to the campaign fund. He does not deny having contributed, not \$10,000, but a considerable sum of money, but always insisted that it created no obligation whatever."

**Under date of November 22nd,** the President writes as follows:

**Hon. J. J. Van Alen:**

The secretary of state has submitted to me your letter of the 20th inst. in which you tender your resignation as ambassador to Italy. I hasten to express my earnest wish that you reconsider this conclusion. The statements contained in your letter are to the effect that you do not accept the appointment, but allow me to observe from their application in full case.

I did not seek you for nomination to the Italian mission without satisfying myself of your entire fitness for the place. Your record of years of service stands without exception. Yet know, and I know, that all the malignant criticism that has been indulged in regarding this appointment has no justification, and that the deepest sympathy we have shown the Republic have been entirely misplaced in their considerations upon whom it rests. We should not yield to the voices which have arisen from those conditions.
