

FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

No. 1 of the Juvenile Instructor is in circulation. Considerable building is in progress. On the 10th inst. the people will be in a position to see the late convention.

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Successful Manufacture.—In the 19th Ward of this city, there is in operation a very successful manufacturing concern. We refer to the tannery operated by Mr. Robert Morris, who is the proprietor. It was established probably between four and five years ago, by Bishop Edward Hunter, upon whose premises the tannery is conducted. Since the first year or so Mr. Morris has operated it on his own account. Notwithstanding that the establishment has made no great outside display, it takes in, on an average, about 400 sheepskins weekly, from which the wool is removed and the best of the skins manufactured into a superior article of brilliantly colored leather, largely used by Z. C. M. I., Solomon Bros., and other makers for facings, linings and topings. The wool is shipped to the east through the agency of Mr. Clawson.

Although facing and lining materials are the specialty, other leathers are successfully made, among which is binding material and goshawk. The latter, however, is not made to any extent, on account of the scarcity of material in Utah. At present Mr. Morris finds a ready market for all that his tannery produces. On the premises is a small steam engine, which is used to propel a contrivance for polishing or glazing the leather. The buildings used are quite extensive, and the business has a fair prospect for steady growth.

Strange Phenomenon.—A fishing party, consisting of Messrs. W. E. Welthe, D. J. Ross, Jr., and Lorus and Valton Pratt, were near the bridge just south of Mr. Pettit's farm, yesterday, when a strange occurrence took place. At 10:30 a.m., with no cloud visible above the horizon, a loud and rapid succession of sounds from directly overhead startled their ears, resembling rattling thunder. All the party and Mr. Pettit, who was near, heard the sounds, for they were very loud and lasted from five to ten seconds, while Messrs. Pettit, Ross and Welthe saw a small mass of smoke or vapor, which disappeared in about five minutes.

Allowing that this was a meteor, and it is not clear what else it could have been, the strangest part is its disappearance producing a succession of explosions. Could it have bursted into parts and these have exploded in turn and so on until the whole was resolved into smoke? Nothing was seen falling from it. Meteors come in the daytime as well as at night, but are not visible because of the light of the sun. Had this appeared at night it would doubtless have presented a magnificent sight.

A Natural Curiosity.—In Colorado is a ten-acre field, which is no more or less than a subterranean lake covered with soil about eighteen inches deep. On the soil is cultivated a field of corn, which produces thirty bushels to the acre. If any one will take the trouble to dig a hole to the depth of a spade-handle he will find it full with water, and by using a hook and line fish four or five inches long may be caught. The fish have neither scales nor eyes, and are perch-like in shape. The ground is a black marl in nature, and in all probability was at one time an open body of water, on which accumulated vegetable matter, which has been increased from time to time until now it has a crust sufficiently strong and rich to produce fine corn, although it has to be cultivated by hand, as it is not strong enough to bear the weight of a horse. While harvesting the hands catch great strings of fish by making a hole through the earth. A person raising on his feet can see the growing corn shake all around him. Any one having sufficient strength to drive a nail through the crust will find on releasing it that it will draw up a large quantity of water.

Sericulture.—The following has been sent us by Mr. Daniel Graves, of Provo: "Here is an extract from the statistical report presented to the Central Board of Trade, April 11th, 1882: Number of trees, 45,717; persons engaged in raising the same, 22; cocoons raised, 337 pounds (without Salt Lake City)—from which there was no return; eggs raised, four ounces; eggs for sale, twenty ounces. The above is what have been reported from the various States, but I have no doubt there are double that number of trees in cultivation. Persons raising eggs for sale must be very careful not to have the cards stained, and they should be thick on the cards. The size should be 8 x 4 inches square, thin paste-board. See instruction given on page 41 of my treatise on sericulture. There are associations who will be purchasing both cocoons and eggs this season in the East."

Protecting the Bear Lake Fishery.—We learn from the Democrat that the sheriff and posse, from St. Charles, Bear Lake Valley, made a raid upon the illegal fisheries at the mouth of St. Charles Creek and the outlet of the lake, on Saturday morning, April 29th. They secured and took possession of about seven hundred yards of gill nets, two anchors, and about three hundred pounds of fish. They also arrested three of the principal parties engaged in the business. The sheriff lay out all Friday night watching for the parties and on Saturday morning, on making the arrests, resistance being offered he found it necessary to send to St. Charles for help. The citizens of St. Charles responded willingly to the call, and on their arrival the property was taken possession of without further trouble.

A Beef Epidemic.—Denver is afflicted with an absolute beef epidemic. On Saturday, Sunday and Monday last there was scarcely any in the market, until a few comparative bovine skeletons, arrived by the Denver & Rio Grande R. R. on the last named day. One of the leading hotel-keepers of Denver telegraphed to Cheyenne for beef and procured some at 20 cents a pound. There is a bad situation for a town of 60,000 inhabitants. The scarcity is felt more or less throughout the entire west, including Utah. Yet we are in the heart of an immense grazing country, but the shipments to the East are tremendous and likely to be continuous.

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The West Company.—The following notice by President A. Carrington appears in the *Millennial Star* of April 24th: "The second company will leave Liverpool on Wednesday, May 17th, in the steamship *Nevada*, Guion Co.'s line. On account of a special agreement, our rate of sea fares from Liverpool to New York cannot, under any circumstances, be allowed to those not members of the Church. Strict attention to this instruction will save expense, time and disappointment."

Fatal Accident.—A fatal accident occurred at Mount Pleasant on Tuesday morning, by which Francis Jensen, 11 years old, son of Peter Jensen, lost his life. He was coming riding on horse-back and when about two blocks from home the horse slipped and fell, throwing him off. Unfortunately one of his feet remained fast in the stirrup. The horse being frightened ran for home, dragging the boy along the ground. He was frightfully bruised about his head and face. He was taken to the house in an unconscious state, and in about twenty minutes afterwards breathed his last.

Dr. F. D. Benedict Dangerously Ill.—For a short time past Dr. F. D. Benedict has been suffering from a severe attack of pneumonia, but up till last night appeared to be progressing favorably. During the evening his nervous system gave way, and he became delirious, in which condition he has remained ever since. A report was in circulation this afternoon that he had died at 12 o'clock, which, however, was happily untrue. We regret to state, however, that scarcely any hope is entertained of his recovery. He has been visited by all the leading physicians of the City.
