#### No Inconvenience is Being Experienced, a Little Forethought Obvisating Any Difficulties Arising.

luquiry among the banks develops the fact that the cashiers checks doing duty as circulating medium are received an currency in trade only in the region whence they are leaued. For instance, such checks from the Salt Lake and Ogden banks are receivable as a circuluting medium only in titah, western Wyoming, Idaho and Nevada, but would not be received as so much cash by merchants elsewhere. Cashier's heeks from Denver banks only circu-

ate in the country that is commercially tichutary to that city, such as the state of Colorado, northern New Mexito and eastern Wyoming; and the Ournha checks circulate in exchange for goods while within the radius of the region tributary to that center. Howwer, a few cushiers' cheeks from banks as far away as Spullane, San Francisco.
