WILSON ESTATE DISPUTE.

Wife County Revenues - Report Showing Amount Paid by Each Precinct.

Wife State Academy Will Open Sept. 16 - Ogden Valley Reservoir. Wedding Bells.

Reuben Fuller, alias Texas Blackie, who escaped from the City Jail Friday morning so mysteriously, after Jailer Critchlow had given him his breakfast shortly after eight o'clock, was recaptured after a short chase by Sheriff Critchlow, who obtained the prisoner and brought him back to Ogden last evening. Fuller said that he locked the door on his cell, and unlocked the door when he was locked perfectly safe, but he would not disclose the facts as to how he picked the lock. Sheriff Critchlow said that he is on route to the county jail where he is wanted. Fuller is expected tomorrow. Fuller is reported to have a very bad record.

NILSEN ESTATE CONTROVERSY.

In the matter of the estate of Lars H. Nilsen, who died at his home in Kaneville, Weber county, Wednesday, August 28, petitions were filed for appointment of an administrator. One petition was filed by the widow of the deceased, Mrs. Ellen Nilsen, praying for her own appointment as administratrix. In the day the five children of the deceased filed a petition asking for the appointment of Heber Swanner, as special administrator, to take immediate possession of the estate, and to have the same appraised and sold for the benefit of the children. Mr. Swanner, a resident of Ogden, is a well-known citizen, and has been appointed as permanent administrator. Mr. Swanner, giving bonds in the sum of \$2,000. The petition of the children is somewhat sensational, and the hearing on the appointment of Mrs. Ellen Nilsen, set mother of the children, as administratrix, alleging that she is ignorant of the English language and incapable of administering the estate, further that she is under the influence of a certain Christian Scientist minister, to such an extent that she would be influenced in all matters pertaining to the estate, and that she prevented all medical attendance at the bedside of her husband except that of the Christian Scientist minister. The estate consists of real estate situated in Kaneville, money in the Ogden State bank, and other personal property, valued at \$6,000. The heirs are Alice N. Swanner of West Weber, Miriam L. Nilsen, Joseph Nilsen, Emmeline Nilsen and Andrew Nilsen, all of Salt Lake. The hearing was set for the petitions on Sept. 16.

SHOCKING GUN ACCIDENT.

Marion Adams Shot in Right Wrist - A Close Call for His Life.

Pleasant Grove, Utah Co., Sept. 2.-Marion Adams, the 15-year-old son of Thomas Adams, of this place, accidentally shot himself in his right wrist while hunting on the "Bald" mountain east of town yesterday morning. The main artery was completely torn away and about four inches of the wrist badly lacerated. The physicians fear the member will have to be amputated. There were two companions with the young man at the time of the accident which happened in this manner: Young Adams was sitting on a large rock to rest, when his gun (a double barrel shot gun) slipped, one of the hammers struck the rock, exploding one barrel, his clothing was torn on his body, making a close call for his life. His companions bound up the wound as best they could and the trio made their way for home, one came ahead, promoting a conveyance and met the unfortunate lad at the mouth of the canyon. Last year this family had a girl frightfully burned and her life was despaired of for months. Much sympathy is felt for them in this case.
