EUGENE REEVES DIES. Promising Young Man Passes Away From Acute Diabetes.

Eugene Reeves, aged 18, son of General Freight Agent J. A. Reeves of the Oregon Short Line, died at 9:30 Wednesday evening. The young man had been seriously ill from acute diabetes less than a week, and not until that time was it known that he was in such a dangerous condition. Every possible effort was made to save him, and the doctors thought removal to a lower altitude might save him. But when this decision was reached, the patient was not sufficiently strong to stand the removal. The lad passed away, his broken hearted parents at the bedside.

The blow is particularly severe to the young man's family because of his unusual promise. Eugene, his third year at the high school where he was a valued member of the battalion band; he had a genial, pleasant nature that endeared him everywhere, and his parents had entertained great hopes of their son's making a name and reputation for himself. They were planning to send the boy to one of the more noted technical schools of the country for a college education, and the future seemed bright, even until the storm overcast the horizon and the blow fell.

The funeral will be held from St. Paul's Episcopal church Friday, at 2 p. m., with interment at Mt. Olivet.

WARFARE CLOSE AT HOME. Red Cross Christmas Stamps the Bullets in Fight Against White Plague.

The American Red Cross, the greatest of philanthropic workers, which goes to the relief of the distressed in all parts of the world in times of war, famine, earthquakes, fires or floods, and which has distributed millions of dollars in money and relief supplies, is waging a warfare close to American homes. It has, with its usual vigor, begun an effort to wipe out tuberculosis or the white plague. The movement against the white plague is in progress in many states and in all of them the money to carry on the work is being raised by the sale of Red Cross Christmas stamps.

The Christmas stamp is similar in size and form to the regulation postage stamp, but the Red Cross stamp will not pay postage. It is a very attractive "sticker" bearing a cheerful Christmas greeting, to be pasted on letters and packages during November and December. The Christmas stamp was sold in Utah for the first time last year, and the public bought about \$200 worth of them at one cent each. The sales for the United States reached about \$1,000,000.

In Salt Lake the sale of stamps will be in charge of Miss Jennings, 49 north Second West, from whom they are sold in any quantity, and they are also on sale at the drug stores, book stores and dry goods stores.

VACCARILLI IS DEAD GLASER MAY RECOVER

If Nightwatchman Leaves Hospital Alive He Must Stand Trial For Murder.

If Emil Glaser, former nightwatchman on South Temple street, recovers from a bullet wound in the abdomen, he will leave St. Mark's hospital only to go to jail, when he must await trial on a charge of murdering Michael Vaccarilli, who died Wednesday night at St. Mark's hospital as the result of two bullet wounds on the left side of the spine, sustained in a pistol duel between the two men in front of the Olympia saloon, 553 west Second South street, on the morning of Dec. 7, at 2:35 o'clock.

According to witnesses, Vaccarilli was in the bar, drinking beer, and chatting with friends, when Glaser, whom he had never seen before, came swaggering in and began to insult the Italian. The conversation had turned on the Spanish-American war, and Vaccarilli happened to say that he had fought in the war, when Glaser called him a liar, slapped his face, struck him with his fist, and beat him over the head with a revolver butt. Vaccarilli, it is said, told Glaser that he did not want to fight with him when he was in such a condition, and other men pleaded with Glaser not to start a fight, and asked him to leave. Vaccarilli, however, did not leave, and through the front door, Glaser running after him. Glaser pulled his revolver and fired two shots into Vaccarilli's back and the latter then turned and shot Glaser twice, one bullet piercing the abdomen and puncturing the intestines in 12 places while the other bullet merely made a superficial wound in the breast.

It developed after the shooting, that Glaser was off his beat and had no business being in that neighborhood at such an hour. It is probable that Glaser will recover, unless unforeseen complications arise.

Vaccarilli's body has been removed to O'Donnell's undertaking establishment, and probably will be shipped to Cleveland, O., where his brother, Frank, lives.

PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS. Association Is Vigorously at Work Perfecting Its Plans.

The Parks and Playgrounds association is not letting any grass grow under its feet in the matter of perfecting its plan of action. The board of control is being organized at the commercial club and arranged a number of important matters. The executive committee was instructed to prepare a report for presentation at a meeting to be held Dec. 27, covering promotion and publicity of the association, membership, legislation, finance and procedure.

As a committee of one, L. P. Kelsey was appointed to ascertain the number and location of vacant lots owned by the city which would be suitable for playgrounds. There has been some talk of asking the city to grant the association the city's tract of land near Ensign Peak. An embryonic plan is to dispose of this and use the proceeds for the establishment of parks and playgrounds.
