

your last decision I have been so sensible of the power of my enemies that my soul cries out before you and the gentlemen of the jury, that they beware how, by a divided verdict, they consign to my children a false and irretrievable stain upon their mother. For five years past I have been the victim of circumstances the most cruel and unfortunate; struggling from time to time only for a place to live honorably and truthfully; released for some months from the will, by whose power unconsciously I criminated myself, again and again I declare solemnly before you, without fear of man and with faith in God, that I am innocent of the crime charged against me. I would like to tell my whole sad story, truthfully; to acknowledge the frequent falsehoods wrung from me by compulsion, though at the same time, unwilling to reveal the secrets of my married life, which only the vital importance of my position makes necessary. I assume the entire responsibility of this request, unknown to friend or counsel of either side, and await your honor's honorable decision. With great respect. (Signed) "ELIZABETH R. TILTON."

The following is Judge Neilson's reply:
"Mrs. Tilton—
"I am directed by Chief Judge Neilson to return your letter, as it cannot be read in court; also to state that in civil cases counsel have the right to refrain from calling a particular witness, however competent, and that neither court nor client can interfere with the exercise of that right. The Judge also instructs me to say that the question whether you could be a witness stands on quite another ground from that considered when your husband was called and sworn: he was a competent witness to testify in his behalf against a third person, defendant, and while the policy of the law was to some extent involved, there was no express statute in the way, but the statute of May 10th, 1867, expressly declares a wife to be incompetent as a witness for or against her husband.

BOSTON, 4.—A suit has been brought against the city of Boston by the assignees in bankruptcy of the estate of Mr. Armstrong, whose store was blown up to prevent the spread of the great fire, to recover \$70,000, the value of the stock and unexpired lease; no one has been found to acknowledge the responsibility of blowing up the premises.
WASHINGTON, 4.—Many laborers employed on the public works have struck for a dollar and a half a day. The contractors say they cannot pay more than one dollar, owing to the low price paid for the work and the loss by the sale of the district bonds.
HUDSON, N. Y., 4.—Early this morning, Hudson Vaudusen, a wealthy and eccentric farmer, shot his mother dead and then killed himself.
NEW ORLEANS, 4.—Judge Morilles, U. S. district judge in the eastern district of Texas, in a charge to the grand jury reviewed the civil rights bill, and expressed the

opinion that all persons have a legal right to have board and lodging at an inn, transportation on steamers and railroads or stages, or entrance into a theatre, while they don't thereby acquire any social rights. To hold that a conductor of a railroad train cannot assign a special car to ladies and children, and their attendants, to the exclusion of all others, provided that other passengers are furnished with cars with all necessary facilities for travelling, would be to state social rights privileges and immunities, therefore my view of the act is that it was not intended to effect social rights but to aid civil and legislative rights. In conclusion the Judge stated that if it should be made to appear that any inn keeper, manager of a theatre or transportation agent has refused proper facilities to any one on account of race, color or previous condition, the grand jury will be authorized to find a bill against them.

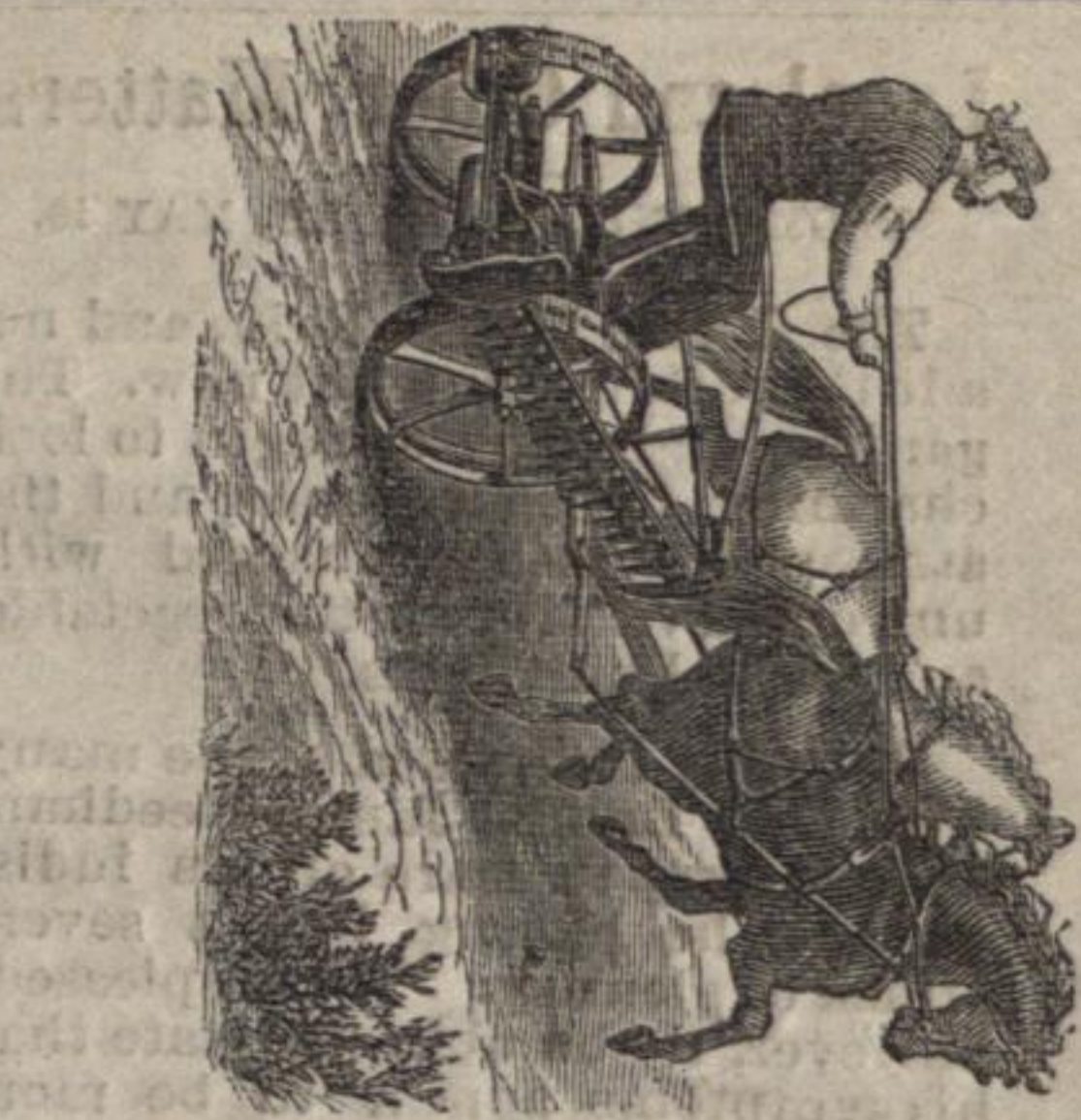

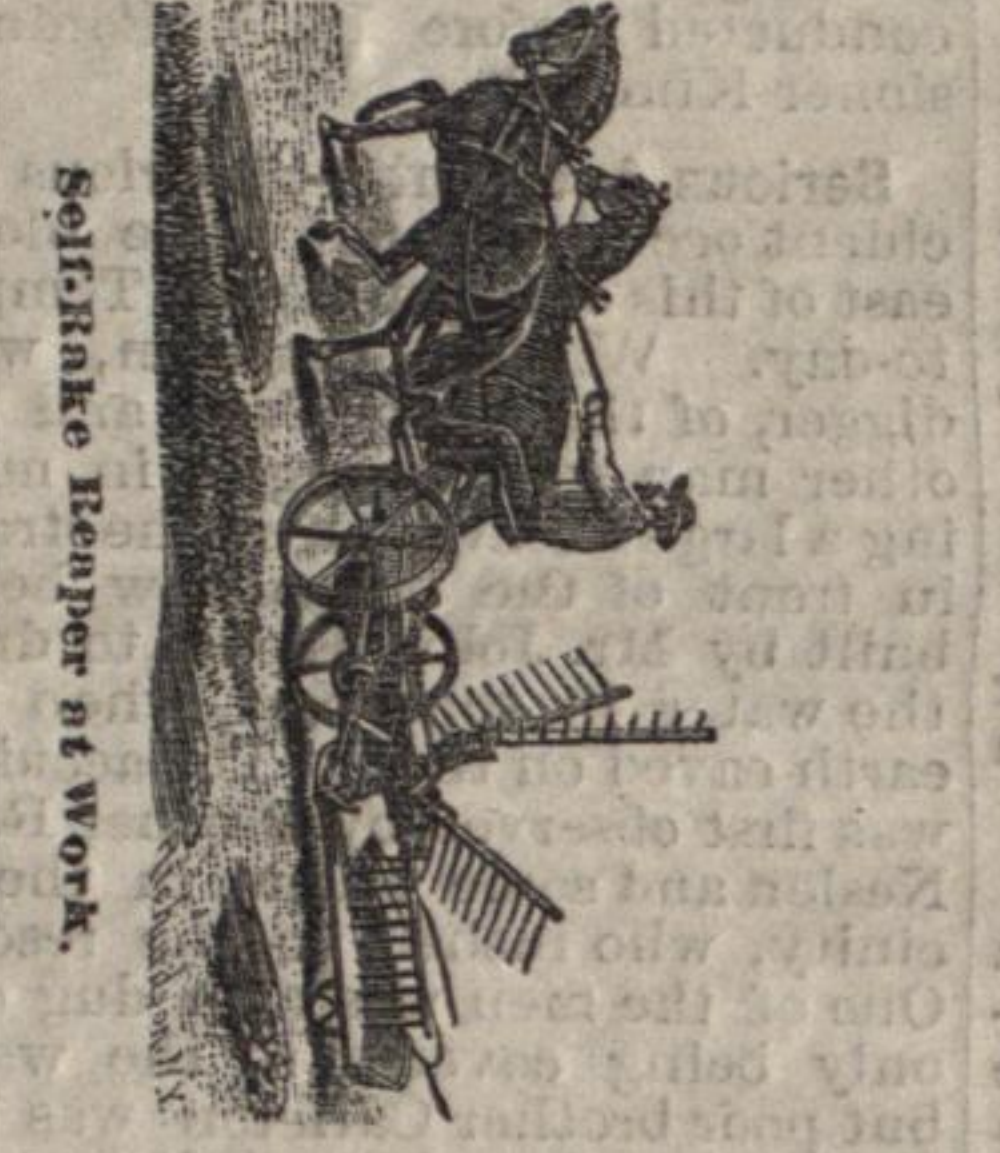

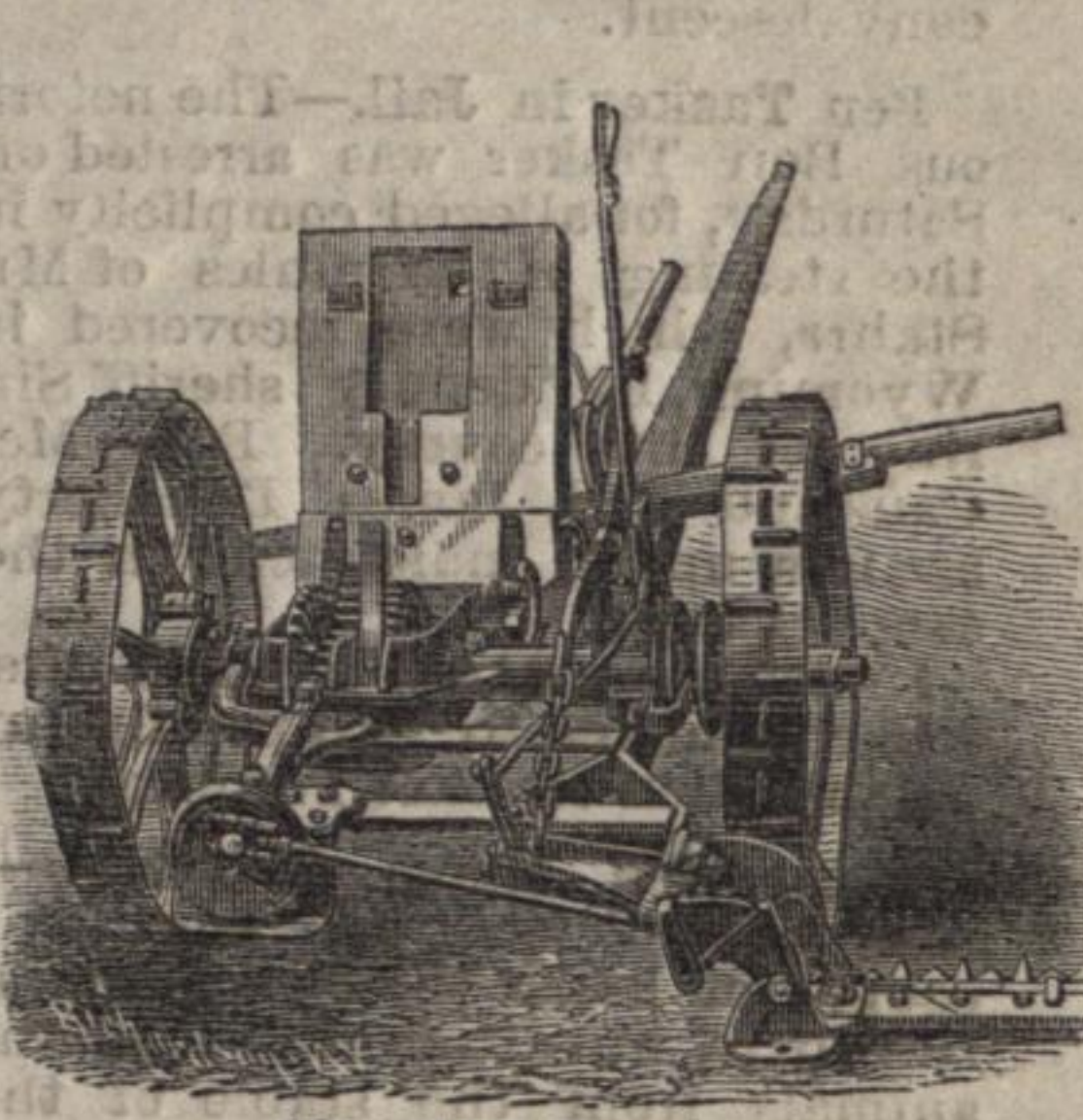
Mower at Work.

MR. WHEELER, whose name as an Inventor and Patentee is familiar not only to manufacturers of Reapers and Mowers, but to the agricultural community generally, has spent twenty-one consecutive seasons in the harvest field in experiment. For the past two years he has devoted his whole time to the organization and test of this Machine, which embraces all the most important and valuable improvements heretofore made and patented to him, combined in the most simple, substantial and symmetrical form, with other improvements made by him, which by practical and thorough test in the field, under his inspection and supervision, have proved valuable and successful.

In introducing them to the farming public of the Far West, we desire to call attention to some of the important features of these Standard Machines, and ask an examination of the same by all who contemplate purchasing a Mower or Combined Mower and Reaper the ensuing season, being satisfied that inspection will lead to a sale.

An examination of the Machine will show that the main or driving wheels are of large size, and are placed further apart on their axle than usual, giving the machine greater steadiness when in use, especially on rough, uneven ground.

Two frames are employed in the construction of this machine, and the same system of gearing as used in the other Chiefs, but it is arranged centrally in the frame, which serves also to shield and protect it.

The lifting devices for the finger bar are the most perfect and effective. The Cutting Apparatus—a very important feature—is entirely different from all others, and its advantages will be apparent on inspection. Its Folding Arrangement as shown in cut is the only convenient mode of transportation by which the machines can be perfectly balanced, perfectly safe, and can be driven ANYWHERE A TEAM CAN GO.

As a Reaper it has a light, compact platform, which can be quickly attached to or detached from the Machine. The Self-Rake used is the same popular Wheeler Rake, so long and successfully in use on our other Machines, and is entirely different from any other in use. In its application to this Machine, all its valuable features are retained, whilst its application is so simplified that it requires but a few moments to attach it to or detach it from the Machine. Two eye bolts serve to hold it in place, by clamping it to the pivot pins of the main shoe. These have simply to be loosened to remove it from the shoe. By the location of the Rake upon the shoe, and the hinging the shoe to the cutter frame, the platform wheel has no part of the weight of the Rake to carry, thus overcoming the difficulty experienced in Machines when the large shoe is located outside of the road wheel by the great weight carried on the platform, causing it to sag and the Machine to run hard, with often severe side draft. The platform is readily adjusted to cut at different heights, and is the most durable platform made in America.

The Gearing as shown by the cut is arranged in the centre of the Machine, in a compact and simple manner, being completely enclosed, thus protecting it from all dirt and grit. Every part of the Machine is duplicated, and tons of extra parts are now on hand at the different agencies in Utah.
