

Take one table spoonfull of fine saltpetre, one do. of fine salt, one do. of ground black pepper; add to this flour and water enough to make it into pills; it will make three about as large as a hulled walnut. These make the cow swallow in this way:

Have her tied in the stable, take hold of her by the nose, open her mouth and drop one in at a time; after she swallows give her another in the same way, and so on. Generally one dose is sufficient; if she is not better, repeat the dose the following day. It has never failed to cure for me.

It would not be prudent to let the cow out in a rain or rough weather for a day or so after giving the above medicine.

MOUSLEY'S CITY ACADEMY.

G. S. L. City, Mar. 10, 1860.

Mr. Editor:

Having had a courteous invitation to visit this academy, I spent a few hours very agreeably a few days since in a private partial examination.

Mr. Mousley has introduced Naylor's new system of arithmetic, by which simple arithmetical questions are solved with the half of the figures usually employed, and the most intricate questions with one tenth of the figures.

He also teaches Naylor's geography, accompanied by Pelton's outline maps, three of which, seven feet by seven, the others six feet by six, decorate his academy. The pupils, in turn, point out the localities with long pointers, while the class chant their lesson, which renders it not only instructive but amusing.

He spoke in high terms of his grammar class, the proficiency of which he felt highly creditable to his pupils. This class closed last week. In hygiene and natural philosophy, a couple of pupils were very promising.

Combined with book-keeping he has given his pupils lessons in ornamental penmanship, which imparts to their books a highly finished character, exhibiting much good taste.

Scholars from West Jordan, Kaysville, Cottonwood, Springville, San Pete and Fillmore, have attended during the winter, some of whom were among the most proficient in the school.

Mr. Geo. W. Mousley is assisted by his brother, Lewis, and Mr. Joseph Foreman, they have taught the past quarter 140 scholars in the following branches, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, grammar, elocution, book-keeping, natural philosophy, anatomy, physiology and hygiene, algebra and surveying, and although they have never brought to their assistance the lash, nor inflicted the slightest corporeal punishment good order is maintained.

REGENT.

TABERNACLE.

SUNDAY, March 11, 1860.

Elder Phineas H. Young addressed the congregation on the necessity of doing that which will tend to the best advancement of the Kingdom of God: spoke of the greater degree of knowledge that we are in the possession of in this dispensation, and called attention to the vast amount of information that may yet be possessed by the Latter Day Saints. Said the light given us to-day will enable us to see the follies of yesterday, and thereby, we shall be qualified to improve, advance and grow in the knowledge of the truth.

President Brigham Young reasoned on the varied capacities of men, and the disposition and inclination of some to cling to some particular principle, instead of letting their minds become so elastic that they can grasp one principle after another, until they have grasped that which is necessary and requisite for their salvation; for his own part he had not decided which principle of truth should occupy his attention the most, for if one item of doctrine should be considered more important than the rest, he did not know which it was.

Reviewed the doctrines of the Quakers, Wesleyan Methodists and Campbellites; showed that the Quakers believed exclusively in the Spirit of the Lord, abrogating all ordinances and ceremonies; this he declared to be an extreme; then others believe in all ceremony; this is the other extreme.

Some believe in the Spirit, others in the breaking of bread and partaking of wine; some believe in baptism by sprinkling, others by pouring, and some few by immersion.

Latter Day Saints believe that they should be fervent in the spirit; they go still farther and partake of the Sacrament; they go down into the water, and are immersed for the remission of sins; they believe in all that the Quakers, Wesleyan Methodists, the Campbellites, and all the reformers believe, and in every thing else that comports with the doctrines revealed in the Bible, the Book of Mormon and Book of Doctrine and Covenants. Those sects are right so far as they go, in the doctrines of religion, but no farther.

Made some remarks on the revelation of the Priesthood with all its keys, powers, privileges and apostolic blessings to Joseph Smith

and Oliver Cowdery. Asserted that God will gather all the light and intelligence that is in the world, all the laws of science, all the truths of astronomy, mechanism and philosophy, and bring them to Zion and to Jerusalem.

If the Elders would go forth and preach the gospel and tell the people that they do not wish any arguments, but that they have got truth to present and then tell the people if they have any truth to hand it out, it would be far better than doing as some of them do. He was perfectly willing that they should gather the truth from every quarter where they might find it—from an infidel as well as as soon as from any body else.

Pointed out the way in which the Jews and other nations had sealed their damnation. Argued the necessity of the people being made perfect through sufferings, that when they came in possession of eternal lives they may know how to govern, how to create, and how to bring forth unto eternal lives all that will hearken to their words and follow in their footsteps.

Observed that the Lord had made the volition of the creature free, but the result of all things he controls and holds in his own hands. Man may plant and water, but God only can give the increase; men may appoint, but he can disappoint; they may go to the nations of the earth on missions, but unless he blesses them it is nothing but disappointment to them.

He thanked the Almighty that he could understand, in many things acknowledge the hand of God, and he hoped to be enabled to do so in all things, for by understanding with the heart and confessing with the mouth, we shall attain salvation.

Read a portion of the 8th Chapter of Matthew, and spoke of the great faith of the centurion therein mentioned; also of the cause of altercations and difficulties in families, and the folly of those who require everybody to be according to their measure and dimensions; recommended mercy and forbearance towards one another, and if a man wanted a positive proof before God that he was right, let him examine his own heart and see whether he loves his brethren.

Commanded the judges in Israel not to decide a case because they loved one man and hated another; but to judge according to righteousness and truth.

or alderman for trial, either with or without process; serve all processes issued by the mayor or any alderman to him directed; and see that all orders and judgments of said courts are carried into effect, also see to the peace and good order of all public meetings; and said marshal may at any time call on the captain of police, or in the absence of the captain, any policeman, who is hereby required to assist in maintaining the peace and good order of the city.

SEC. 3. The marshal shall have power to appoint one or more deputies as he may deem necessary, for whom he shall be responsible, whose term of office shall expire with that of the marshal, or may by him be removed at pleasure, which said deputy or deputies shall, before acting as such, take an oath for the faithful performance of the duties of their office.

PART 4—AUDITOR OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

SEC. 1. There shall be an auditor of public accounts, who shall be appointed, qualified and give bonds in the same manner as for the recorder, provided the bonds shall be in the penal sum of ten thousand dollars.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the auditor to examine and audit all public accounts connected with the financial affairs of the city, and issue orders upon the treasurer in liquidation of claims allowed or appropriations made by the city council.

SEC. 3. He shall have the custody of, and keep all books, papers, records, documents, vouchers and all conveyances, leases, mortgages, bonds and other securities appertaining to the fiscal affairs and the property of the city, which are not required by ordinance to be kept in some other office or place, and to have charge of all property of the city where no other provision is made by ordinance for the keeping thereof.

SEC. 4. The auditor shall make a report to the city council on the first Tuesday in June next and quarter thereafter setting forth a statement of the amount of city revenue, specifying in said statement from whence derived and for what disbursed; he shall deliver to his successor in office, all books, moneys, accounts, or other property in his custody belonging to the city, as soon as his successor shall be qualified.

PART 5—SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

SEC. 1. There shall be a sealer of weights and measures appointed by said council, who shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, take an oath and give bonds in the penal sum of one thousand dollars conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties thereof, which said bonds shall be approved by and filed with the city recorder.

SEC. 2. The sealer of weights and measures shall, twice in every year from the date of this ordinance, at intervals not exceeding seven months, and oftener if required, examine and test the accuracy of all weights, measures, scales, or other things used by merchants and others for weighing or measuring anything bought or sold by them, to stamp with a suitable seal to be prescribed by the mayor, all weights, measures and scales so used, which he may find conforming, or which may be made to conform, to the standard prescribed by the laws of this Territory, and to deliver to the owner thereof a certificate of their accuracy.

SEC. 3. It shall further be his duty to register the names of all persons whose weights, measures or scales he may find to be accurate, and of all persons who fail to have the same corrected when not so found, he shall seize in the name of the city all false weights, measures and scales which he may find and which the owner shall fail immediately to have made conformable to the provision of this ordinance, and immediately report such persons to the mayor or alderman; he shall also further report in writing every six months to the city recorder the names of the persons and number of weights, measures and scales examined and found by him to be correct.

SEC. 4. All persons using weights, measures, scales or other things for weighing or measuring any article bought or sold in this city shall cause the same to be examined, tested and sealed as hereinbefore provided, and any person failing to do so shall be liable to pay a fine of not less than one nor more than fifty dollars for each offence, and all damages accruing to any party injured in consequence of any such failure or neglect.

SEC. 5. The sealer of weights and measures shall be entitled to receive for each examination, testing, sealing and certifying as hereinbefore required from the owner of the same as follows:—

Any steelyards, or beam, ground, floor, platform, counter, or other scale by which may be weighed not exceeding two hundred pounds - 25c

Any such instrument by which may be weighed over two hundred and less than six hundred pounds - 50c
Over six hundred and less than twelve hundred pounds - \$1.00
Over twelve hundred pounds - 1.50
For any yard stick, dry or liquor measure - 10c
Any nest or set of measures - 25c
and the weights attached to any scale shall as to the compensation of the sealer of weights and measures be considered a part of the scale; provided that Where any such weight, measure or instrument, upon subsequent examination, be found correct, and shall not be required to be stamped a second time, the aforesaid sealer of weights and measures shall not receive more than one half the compensation provided for.

SEC. 6. The sealer of weights and measures shall examine and test any of the before mentioned instruments for weighing or measuring on application by any person who shall tender to him the fee, which, by the preceding section, he is authorized to receive; and he shall, in every case where he may employ labor or material in making accurate any weight or measure, be entitled to extra compensation therefor, and to retain the article upon which such labor or material has been employed until such compensation be paid.
