

H. F. No. 71, "A bill defining the First and Third Judicial Districts," passed.

Mr. Hatch, chairman of the special committee, appointed to apportion legislative representation of the Territory, presented the following report:

Your special committee appointed to act with a like committee from the Council in redistricting the Territory, and apportioning the representation thereof, have given the matter due consideration, and ask leave to report the accompanying bill, and recommend its early consideration by the House.

H. F. No. 77, "Apportioning the representation of Utah Territory," was read the first time and made special order for to-morrow.

Mr. Peery presented petition of Fred. J. Kiesel and 85 others, citizens of Ogden, asking for power to issue bonds to construct waterworks, which was read and referred to the committee on municipal corporations.

Mr. Murdock presented H. F. No. 78, "To amend the charters of incorporated cities not otherwise provided for," which was read, and referred to the committee on municipal corporations.

Mr. Penrose, chairman of committee appointed to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of Hon. A. P. Rockwood, deceased, presented the following report:

Your special committee instructed to prepare resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Hon. A. P. Rockwood, deceased, beg leave to report the following [see local column] and ask to be discharged from further duties in relation to the subject. Report adopted and committee discharged.

House adjourned until Tuesday, at 10 o'clock a.m.

Tuesday, February 17, 1880.

A message from the Council was received and read, asking for a conference committee on proposed amendments to C. F. No. 13. The Speaker appointed Messrs. Pack, Sharp and Fisher conference committee.

Mr. Fisher presented petition of Stearns Hatch and Jos. Hogan for pay for jury service accompanied by certificate of Clerk of the Third District Court. Referred to committee on claims, etc.

Mr. McKinnon presented petition of the assessor and collector of Rich County, asking for \$119 remission of certain taxes. Referred to committee on claims, etc.

Mr. Peery presented H. F. No. 79, "To amend certain sections of the Compiled Laws of Utah," read first time and referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Preston moved that H. F. No. 1, "Removing the political disabilities of women," be taken from the table. Carried. The bill was then read the second time by sections and on motion of Mr. Murdock was read the third time by its title and on motion of Mr. McKinnon passed.

On motion of Mr. Grover the ayes and noes were called. Ayes—Fisher, Francis, Gardner, Horne, Jacques, Johnson, Lyman, McKinnon, Murdock, Penrose, Peterson, Preston, Snow, Thompson and the Speaker, 15. Noes—Dusenberry, Farr, Grover, Hatch, Pack, Peery, Sharp and Smith, 8.

Mr. Preston, chairman of enrollment reported the following bills correctly enrolled and sent to the Governor.

H. F. No. 73, "To organize San Juan Co.," H. F. No. 54, "Repealing Section 1603, and amending Section 1692 Compiled Laws," H. F. No. 13, "Amending Section 1732 Compiled Laws."

Mr. Grover, chairman of roads, etc., reported back favorably petition of citizens of Piute Co., asking for \$2,000 to make a road down the Sevier River. Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

Mr. Farr reported back C. F. No. 27, "Amendatory of supplement to chap IV Title XI, Compiled Laws of Utah," without amendment.

H. F. No. 77, "Apportioning the representation of Utah," special order for to-day, was taken up on its second reading, pending which it was referred to the committee on counties, with Messrs. Francis and Penrose added.

C. F. No. 27, amendatory of and supplemental to Chap. IV, Title XI, Compiled Laws of Utah, was read the second time by sections, third time by its title and passed.

Mr. Murdock presented petition of F. R. Clayton and others asking for an appropriation to establish a high school at Beaver. Referred to the committee on claims.

Mr. Peterson presented petition of

Jac. Spencer and others, Indians of Thistle Valley, asking to change the boundary of Sanpete and Utah counties; referred to the committee on counties.

Mr. Johnson moved that the committee on appropriations be instructed to consider the propriety of adding to the general appropriation bill \$1,500 to make a road through Kanab Cañon. Carried.

House took recess until 2 p.m.

Tuesday, Feb. 17, 2 p.m.

H. F. No. 76, "Amending the charter of Fillmore City," was read the first time, and laid on the table to come up when called for.

C. F. No. 16, "To incorporate Park City," was read the first time and laid on the table until called for.

H. F. No. 65, "To incorporate villages," was read the third time by its title, and passed.

Messages were received, stating that the Council had received communication from His Excellency Governor Emery, announcing the approval of (C. F. Nos. 22, 38, 25 and 36), and the Council had passed (C. F. No. 34), "Licensing and regulating the sale of liquor."

Also, concurred in House amendments to (C. F. No. 27), "Amending corporations."

C. F. No. 34, "Licensing and regulating the sale of liquor," was read and passed.

The following message from the Governor was received and read:

Hon. Orson Pratt, Sen., Speaker of the House of Representatives:

Sir:—I have the honor to inform you that I have approved and filed with the Secretary of the Territory the following bills:

H. F. No. 69, entitled "An act for the protection of bee culture."

H. F. No. 62, entitled "An act defining the amount of the bonds of the Auditor of Public Accounts, and Territorial and County Treasurers."

H. F. No. 73, entitled "An act providing for the organization of San Juan County and changing the boundaries of Emery County."

Mr. Murdock presented the following motion:

I move that the committee on appropriations be instructed to consider the propriety of incorporating in the General Appropriation Bill the sum of \$340, for the purpose of cancelling that amount of court scrip, which has been issued from the Second Judicial District Court of this Territory for criminal business, for the September term, 1879; also a portion for previous years. I hold in my hands the said scrip.

The following messages from the clerk of the Council were received and read:

I am directed to inform your Hon. Body that the Council had accepted the adverse report of the committee in charge of H. F. No. 55, "Amending chapter IV, title XI of the Compiled Laws," and the same is therefore respectfully returned; and that the Council has this day passed H. F. No. 47, the "School Bill," with amendments.

H. F. 47, received from the Council, was laid on the table until to-morrow morning.

Mr. Penrose, chairman of education, presented the following report:

Your committee on education, to whom was referred two petitions, asking for an appropriation for a high school, at Beaver, beg leave to return the same with the recommendation that they be laid on the table, as we consider that such an appropriation is inexpedient at the present time.

Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

Mr. Carrington, chairman of municipal corporations, etc., made the following report:

Your committee on municipal corporations, etc., to whom was referred H. F. 78, herewith return said bill, and respectfully report that we do not deem it expedient to pass it.

Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary presented the following report:

Your committee to whom was referred H. F. 9, "A bill to amend Sec. 1274 of Compiled Laws of Utah," respectfully ask leave to report back said bill, and recommend that it does not pass.

Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

House adjourned until Wednesday at 10.30 a.m.

Mr. Hatch reported back H. F. No. 77, "Apportioning the representation of Utah Territory," with amendments. Amendments read and adopted, and H. F. No. 77 read by sections, third time by its title and passed.

Message from the Council was re-

ceived, announcing concurrence in House amendments to C. F. No. 34, "Liquor bill," and the adverse action of Council on H. F. No. 33, "Amending Section 163 of the Compiled Laws," and H. F. No. 18, "To change the time of holding elections."

Mr. Hatch, chairman of committee on counties, reported H. F. No. 80, "To change the boundary of Sanpete and Utah Counties, which was read first time and recommitted.

Mr. Hatch, chairman of committee on counties, reported on Petition of J. J. Thayne and 31 others, asking to change the boundary of Summit and Wasatch Counties, and recommended that the petition be not granted. Recommendation adopted. Minutes called for.

House took recess until 2 p.m.

Wednesday, Feb. 18, 2 p.m.

H. F. No. 47, "To provide for the establishment and support of district schools, etc.," Council amendments read, and with some exceptions, adopted. Committee of conference appointed on the Council amendments not concurred in.

C. F. No. 17, "Repealing section 1737 of the Compiled Laws of Utah," passed.

H. F. No. 80, "To change the boundary of Sanpete, Utah and Wasatch Counties," passed.

Mr. Pack, chairman of the committee of conference to consider C. F. No. 13, presented the following report:

Your committee of conference, appointed to act with like committee from the Council, to consider the amendments to C. F. No. 13, respectfully report that your committee has agreed to a further amendment to said bill and ask that it be incorporated therein.

Report accepted and amendments adopted.

Mr. Penrose presented H. F. No. 81, "In relation to County and Probate Courts," which passed.

Mr. Preston, chairman of enrollment, presented the following report:

Your committee on enrollment report that H. F. No. 61, "Special elections," has been carefully enrolled, and February 17, at 5 p.m., forwarded to the Governor, for his approval.

H. F. No. 79, "To amend certain sections of the Compiled Laws of Utah Territory," was read and passed.

On motion of Mr. Dusenberry, title amended.

Mr. Peterson presented petition of A. E. Merriam, Assessor and Collector of Sanpete County, asking for \$248.83 remission of certain taxes, and moved its reference, without reading, to the committee on claims, etc. Referred.

Mr. Hatch, chairman of the committee on counties, presented the following report:

Your committee on counties, to whom was referred petition of 159 citizens of Rich County, asking for removal of County seat from Randolph to Laketown; also remonstrance of members of county court of Rich County asking that it be not removed, have had the same under advisement, and ask leave to report the accompanying bill, and desire that it be put upon its passage.

H. F. No. 82, "To authorize the citizens of Rich County to locate their county seat by vote." Passed.

The following message from the Governor was received and read:

Hon. Orson Pratt, Sen., Speaker of the House of Representatives:

Sir:—I have the honor to inform you that I have this day approved and filed with the Secretary of the Territory:

(H. F. No. 72), entitled "An act allowing reward to convicts, and commuting their term of sentence for meritorious conduct."

(H. F. No. 21), entitled "An act amending section 1020 of the Compiled Laws of Utah."

(H. F. No. 68), entitled "An act providing for the organization of Uintah County, and defining the boundaries thereof."

(H. F. No. 61), entitled "An act amending 'An act to provide for special elections to fill vacancies,' approved February 22, 1878."

Mr. Jacques presented a resolution touching an appropriation to the Utah Library, which was referred to the committee on claims, etc. (See local column).

Mr. Farr, chairman of judiciary, presented the following report:

Your committee on judiciary, to whom was referred (C. F. No. 35) "A bill amending 'An act regulating the mode of procedure in criminal cases,'" ask leave to report back the same with amendments, and recommend its passage as amended. Report accepted and recommendation adopted.

(C. F. No. 35), "To amend an act regulating the mode of procedure in criminal cases," was laid on the table to come up in its order.

House adjourned until Thursday, at 10.30 o'clock a.m.

C. F. No. 35, "To amend an act relating to the mode of procedure in criminal cases," approved Feb. 22, 1880, was read, third time by title and passed.

A message from the council was received, announcing passage of C. F. No. 39, "To provide right of way for canals." C. F. No. 39 was read first time and referred to committee on irrigation.

Mr. Johnson, chairman of conference committee on the school bill, reported favorably to concurring with Council amendments.

Report accepted and recommendations of the committee adopted, except in relation to Mr. Jacques' amendment to section 10.

A message from the Council was received, announcing passage of H. F. No. 27, "Pertaining to highways."

Council amendments taken up, pending their reading, House took recess until 2 p.m.
