## WILL USE FREIGHT AUTO.

The first freight auto ever brought to Nevada arrived yesterday from Mil-waukee, consigned to the Standard Mining company of Bodie, says the Gazette of Reno, which will put it into Gazette of Reno, which will put it into general service, running between Thorne and Bödie and Minden and Bodie. The auto-truck is a monster of its kind, weighing 14,000 pounds, built almost altogether of steel, carry-ing 45-horsepower and having a speed of from six to 15 miles an hoar. The giant truck is about 16 feet long and has a carrying and hauling capacity of 46,000 pounds, more than can be placed in an ordinary railroad car. placed in an ordinary railroad car.

The ex-act location is about 40 feet from the shaft and assays show values of four per cent copper, 10 ounces in silver and \$2 in gold.
