LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lecture on Mark Twain—Rev. W. T. Brown will lecture tonight, in Unit hall on "The Revolutionary Faith of Mark Twain," followed by a meeting of local Socialists.

Poultrymen to Meet—A meeting of the Utah State Poultry Association will be held Thursday evening, Sept. 2, 1939, at 8 o'clock, at the Commercial club. The public is cordially invited to attend.

Governor to Deliver Address—The Salt Lake public school teachers held their first general meeting of the new school year, Saturday next at 10 a. m. in the Lafayette school building. Governor Sayre is to make an address.

Mine in Hospital—B. R. Williams, superintendent of the Moscow mine near Safford, Ariz., is in the hospital with a badly broken leg. He was entering the mine when a large rock became dislodged and fell on his leg causing a bad break.

Alleged Deserter Arrested—W. R. Henley, alleged to be a deserter from the United States Army, was apprehended on Commercial street last night by Patrolman Kest, and given over to the military authorities at Fort Douglas today. Henley is said to have deserted from a company stationed at the Presidio.

Orphanage Entertained—The Salt Lake Orphanage children were entertained yesterday afternoon at the Orphanage by Miss Gretie Gosgriff with a bounteous spread, followed by a lawn party. Tables were set under the trees. Bishop Egan, Vice-Governor Kest, and Dr. and Mrs. Kest were present to assist.

Food Man Kept Busy—During the month of August the city food inspector has condemned 784 pounds of meat as unfit for consumption along with 45 pounds of other food and he has inspected 150 slaughterhouses and 134 meat markets with beneficial results to the consumer.

Expect McMurray Cup—General Secretary Cox of the Y. M. C. A. expects the McMurray cup here from Minneapolis in two weeks. It is held in this city for one year. If the cup is won a third time by Salt Lake, it becomes local property permanently. There is no provision for any more cups when the one is finally located in any one place.

Low Joint on Murry Line—A low rail joint on the Murry line on the jump track at Sixteenth Street street yesterday, the car plowing through mud and over ties for 100 feet before stopping. The passengers were shaken up considerably, but no one was hurt or much damage done to the car. However, traffic was delayed for over an hour.

Mars and Moon Pass—The moon eclipsed the planet Mars last night, a phenomenon that was noted with marked interest by astronomers all over the country. The moon will next eclipse Mars on the 25th inst. However, Mars "red golden flame" was not "softened by the pale astral light of the lunar orb" as a morning paper's statement to the contrary notwithstanding.

Detay Briggs Dies at Beaver—Mrs. Detay Briggs, mother of Mr. Nano Berkshaw of 542 1/2 East Fifth South street, died at Beaver on Tuesday last. She was 34 years of age and had many relatives in Salt Lake City, including a number of grandchildren and great grandchildren. She is survived by her husband. The funeral services were to be held at Beaver today.

"Points With Pride"—Mrs. Margaret Zane Wilcher, county clerk continues in the "points with pride" class of officials. This morning her report for August showed that the receipts of the office were \$2,728.40 as compared with \$1,879.70 for the corresponding month of the year. Each month of the year since Mrs. Wilcher assumed office has shown a marked increase in the revenues.

Theater Damaged by Water—Considerable damage was done to property east of the Colonial on Third South street last night by the bursting of a six inch watermain. The break was caused by a defective connection. The street was flooded and a large quantity of water ran into the basements before the leak was repaired. While the flood was on the water pressure dropped from 124 to 30 pounds.

Lester, a proprietor of a small store in the vicinity of the depot, and imposed a fine of \$10. The testimony introduced in the case yesterday tended to show that the altercation between the two men had arisen in the jealousy cropping out of the business of lending automobiles left at the depot.
