

How to Make a Cup of Cocoa. Take a tablespoon of cocoa and put it in a tin cup. Add one tablespoon of granulated sugar and one tablespoon boiling water. Mix well, so that there will not be any lumps of cocoa. Pour a little less than one-half pint of milk into a saucepan and cook it, stirring all the time, until it is scalded,—that is until a film forms on it and it begins to bubble a little. Stir the cocoa mixture into this, and cook until it boils up.

Scrambled Eggs for Three.

Break five eggs into a bowl. Add two teaspoonsfuls of salt and one of pepper. Beat for a minute with an egg-beater. Add one couful of milk and beat a little longer. Have a saucepan on a hot part of the stove: put it into it one tablespoonful of butter and let it melt. Pour in the mixture and stir slowly. Pretty soon the eggs will begin to stick to the bottom of the pan; keep scraping it
