The three-piece suit-gored skirt, jumper waist and rather long coat-solves the problem to a nicety. It can be smart without being either pronounced or conspicuous; serviceable without sacrificing a woman's natural love for attractive clothes.

For instance, an excellent costume of elephant-gray serge includes a coat with cutaway fronts and the smart pointed outline at the bottom. The Consul collar and cuffs and buttons are of black satin, as is the narrow sash that forms the girdle and ties a trifle to one side of the front of the skirt. The dress is in a dull, inconspicuous gray-and-black check. The three-piece skirt with circular sides opens at the left side of the front, and has a flat panel down the back. The front of the jumper-like waist is cut in a tab that fastens with small black satin buttons to a chemise of plaited muslin. Unlike most jumpers, this particular one is endowed with pretty mousquetaire-like sleeves of the cloth, which feature all women will look upon with favor; the jumper requiring a separate chemise only, instead of an entire gump.
