Butte, Mont., July 10.-Attorney Gen-eral Albert J, Galen, who is in Butte to-day, placed a damper upon the proposed second race meeting for Silver Bow county. In the last few months there has been much discussion as to the failure of Jeffries to post his for-feit, and this failure has elicited much criticism. Replying to this, Jeffries states that his theatrical contract will not permit of him signing articles to fight any one, and for that reason he has refused to post a forfeit until his stage work is finished."
