SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

Mahler Suburban Railway Franchise Turned Down by the City Fathers.

AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

Federal of Hon. Thomas D. Dee Wednesday—Wm. Brown Gets \$2,500 Damages—Candidates for Mayorship.

Ogden, Utah, July 11.—At the session of the city council last night the application of B. Mahler for a franchise to construct and operate an electric railway line through the city of Ogden was turned down. Mr. Mahler sprung a surprise by consenting to accept a franchise for 50 years instead of a hundred years, as the great objection has been, insofar as it has been expressed, to granting a franchise for a hundred years. All save three of the councilmen, Craig, Chambers and Emmett, voted against granting a franchise in this amended form.

Considerable feeling developed when Mr. Mahler, when given district No. 1 to speak, called attention to some of the inconsistencies of the councilmen voting against his franchise, saying that he was now convinced that some other influence than the one that had been alleged was responsible for the adverse vote.

Councilman J. C. Nye was elected mayor pro tem, to serve during the absence of Mayor Glasman in Portland. This selection was made after Chambers and Randall had declined the honor.

The mayor reappointed J. A. Howell, M. W. Williams, Tiesel and Mrs. Jennie Nelson members of the Carnegie free library board.

Claims were allowed amounting to \$2,500.

The use of Lester Park pavilion was granted to the Modern Woodmen one night each week and on Saturdays for the purpose of drilling.

The contract for the construction of the extension of sewer district No. 11 was let to Wheelwright Bros. for \$763. The contract for resurfacing Twenty-fourth street from Washington to Grant with asphalt was let to P. J. Moran, the only bidder, for \$10,578.20.

A petition of the Boyle Furniture company asking permission to construct a track from Wall avenue to the common warehouse was referred to the street committee.

On motion of Craig the street committee was instructed to employ a force of men to remove the loose rocks from the bridge north on Washington avenue.

On motion of Craig also, a notice of intention to curb and gutter Washington avenue from Twelfth street to the Ogden river bridge was adopted.

WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS.

Tomato Blight Causing Serious Loss—Special Sheep Tax.

At the meeting yesterday of the county commissioners it was reported by Chairman John Stanford that some species of blight had attacked the tomato plants at the county infirmary farm and that the entire crop will in all likelihood be destroyed. The same blight is attacking the tomatoes elsewhere in the county and will do many thousands of dollars damage.

Mr. Madison reported to the board that he had instructed the road supervisor of West Weber to take what action he could to prevent the water from collecting in a slough complained of by Mr. Walsh and that this action was satisfactory to Mr. Walsh.

Commissioner Wilson reported that Miriam L. Bybee, road supervisor of Uintah, had died and that his son had been acting as road supervisor temporarily and would continue to do so for 60 days.

The board appointed Joseph Stanford, chairman of the board, to represent the county as delegate to the Transmississippi congress at Portland, Aug. 15 to 19.

Mr. Madison also reported that the bridge across Salt creek was in need of repairs and the matter was referred to Commissioner Stanford with power to act.

Mr. Stanford reported that the necessary affidavits had not been filed in the matter of the application for the \$15,000 asked for by the family of W. H. Clark, a Grand Army man recently deceased.

Thomas Moore of Hooper complained that Joseph Powers had fenced up a road leading down to the river in that district. The matter was referred to Commissioner Stanford for report.

A communication was received from the state board of sheep commissioners notifying the county board that a tax of 3 mills had been levied on all sheep within the state. The communication was for the purpose of aiding the board in making the general tax levy.

FUNERAL OF JUDGE DEE.

School Children and Teachers and Civic Bodies Will Attend.

All arrangements for the funeral of Judge Thomas D. Dee have been completed. At 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon the last sad rite over his mortal remains will be performed at the Ogden tabernacle. The funeral will be held in Ogden city, as all Ogden mourners in this desire. Many of the business houses of the city will be closed tomorrow afternoon out of respect to his

memory. The Weber club, board of education, and board of equalization will attend the funeral in a body. The school teachers and all the school children of the city will assemble at the Grant school building, where they will join the funeral cortege at 1:30 o'clock prompt. It is expected that several thousand children will be out to honor the father of Judge Dee, who has been the father of education in Ogden during the past thirty-five years.

It is expected that President Joseph F. Smith, Governor Cutler, and other prominent church and state officials will be present to participate in the services over his remains.

"In Memoriam," beautiful words by Tennyson, and music by Prof. Squire Cook, composed especially to be rendered at the funeral of Reese Dee, will be sung at the funeral of his father tomorrow. The Ogden tabernacle choir has also prepared some choice music to be rendered.

The remains of Judge Dee will lie in state tomorrow (Wednesday) at his late home, 806 Washington avenue, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 12:30 p. m. The funeral services will be held at the home at 2 o'clock, in order to get to the tabernacle at 2 o'clock for the services.

CANDIDATES FOR MAYORSHIP

Dr. A. S. Condon and J. C. Nye Out for the Position.

The atmosphere is beginning to fill with rumors of candidates for various public offices at the coming November election, and foremost among the candidates mentioned for mayor is Dr. A. S. Condon on the Republican ticket. He has many friends who have been urging him to go into the race and he has consented to do so. The present mayor, William Glasman, has announced that he will not be a candidate again. J. C. Nye, of the city council, is also out for the mayoralty, and other candidates will be named.

Dr. Condon appears to be in the lead.

WM. BROWN GETS \$2,500 VERDICT.

The case of William Brown against the Southern Pacific Railroad company and the Ogden Union Depot company, which has been on trial since last Wednesday, was completed yesterday afternoon in the second district court and submitted to the jury.

The jury, after an hour's deliberation, brought in a verdict in favor of Mr. Brown for \$2,500. The action was brought against the defendants to recover \$15,000 for damages to his horse and to show that last November Mr. Brown was driving a team on election day, that in the evening while crossing over the railroad tracks at the foot of Twelfth street, the horse was struck by a train and knocked from his buggy, sustaining serious injury, and demolishing the vehicle, that the accident occurred because of the carelessness of the railroad company in not ringing the bell on the engine, and in not having a watchman at the crossing.

MISS ELIZA ANDERSON DEAD.

Miss Eliza Anderson died yesterday at the home of her parents, Hagbert and Warren Anderson, on Eighteenth street, of heart trouble, from which she had suffered for several months. She was in the twentieth year of her age, bright, winsome and popular with a large circle of friends. She had been ill since last winter, but only turning the last few days did the illness take such a serious turn. Her father, summoned from Lewiston, Idaho, arrived from the dangerous symptoms, arrived Friday. Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 o'clock in the Third ward meetinghouse.

MIKE BERLIN FORFEITS \$200 BAIL.

The case of the state against Mike Berlin, charged with attempting to bribe him with \$200 for the district attorney to use his influence to have the case of extortion against Berlin dismissed, was called on for judgment yesterday afternoon before Judge Murphy, but Berlin failed to appear and the court ordered the \$200 bail forfeited. A bench warrant was issued for the arrest of Berlin and placed in the hands of Sheriff Bailey, but Berlin's whereabouts are unknown, he having left Ogden.

ROAD TAX ELECTION TODAY.

Today a special road tax election is being held at Randall, Uintah, Wilson, West Weber, and Warren for the purpose of determining whether or not a five mill special road tax shall be levied in these districts for the raising of funds with which to do an extra amount of road work this year. A large number of the districts in the county in years gone by have levied such a tax and have found it an excellent way to raise funds with which to improve the public highways.

ACCUSED OF SERIOUS OFFENSE.

Revolational charges have been made against T. G. Richards, residing at 2128 Ogden avenue, by his step-daughter, Olivia Lewis, who is in her thirteenth year. Her statements, made to the police officers, were such that Officer James P. Hendar yesterday swore out a warrant for Richards' arrest.

Richards indignantly denies the story of the little girl, who, who knew nothing of the matter until yesterday, stands by her husband, refusing to believe the statements of the child. The arrested man had no trouble in getting responsible bonded by Fred Mattson, a local saloon keeper, making becoming his sureties.

Since the arrest the little girl has varied somewhat as to the details of her statements, which at first were quite positive and were made when not confronted with her step-father.

CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

A communication was received from Mayor Roylance at the meeting of the city council last evening disapproving a claim of Councilman Johnson amounting to \$9 for horse hire to and from his work at the waterworks extension. The claim was allowed notwithstanding the mayor's objection, only one member voting against the allowance.

Mayor Roylance also disapproved a claim of \$150 by Leo Thurman for attending fire drills. The reason being that Mr. Thurman is not a fireman and is an employee of the city. The claim was allowed by a unanimous vote of the council.

Recorder Harding presented the financial statement of the city for the quarter ending June 30, showing cash on hand amounting to \$9170.97.

The recorder also submitted a statement of the estimated expenses for the remaining portion of the year. The expenses are estimated at \$19,545, which will require \$4,555 to be raised from licenses, and he estimates that \$5,000 can be raised from this source.

PROMISING BEET CROP.

Funeral of John Lewis—Sugar City News.

Lehi, Utah, Co., July 7.—Mr. George Austin, general agricultural superintendent of the Utah Sugar company, returned from the north last night, and summed in brief condition as follows:

"I have spent two days visiting the beet fields at Idaho Falls and Sugar City, and I find the outlook there is very promising for a good crop this season. I intended to visit Big Horn basin this trip, where they are growing sugar beets for the second year by way of experiment, but will have to make this trip some time next month. On my way back I spent three days at Garland. Conditions are very favorable and everything indicates that there will be a good crop of beets and the latest crops of grain that have ever been raised in the valley, and no doubt many fields of oats will yield 100 bushels per acre and upwards, and a great deal of the wheat crop will run from 30 to 40 bushels per acre. The hay crop is practically all in the stacks, and the second crop is well advanced. The farmers as a rule are taking very good care of their beets, and make it their first consideration. The Malad Valley railroad is pushing for Malad City as fast as possible, and the track is away beyond Garland now. The company has just started to lay out a large new beet line there that will have a capacity of from 14,000 to 15,000 tons, and the site is also being enlarged to take care of the additional amount of product that will be raised. The beet crop in Utah county, so far as I have seen, with very few exceptions, is very promising, and the Lehi factory this fall will not doubt have all it can possibly do to take care of the crop."

Mr. Austin will go down to Sapperton and Sever counties to inspect the beet crop there, the first of next week, and Dr. Williams has promised that he would send one of the Agricultural college staff with Mr. Austin, to look over the beet fields, as Mr. Austin understands the beet crop better than anyone in the Sugar valley.

W. railroad train early on the morning of the 4th, were held Wednesday day morning from the home of his wife, Mrs. Lewis, at 10 o'clock. The speakers were Thomas H. Jones, Bishop Andrew Field, Wm. Southwick, President A. J. Evans and Jackson Wainika, who offered comforting words to the bereaved wife and relatives. Mr. Lewis was 27 years old and leaves a wife and one child.
