AFFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY

**Funeral of Hon. Thomas D. Dee Wednes-
day—Wm. Brown Gets \$2,569 Dam-
ages—Candidates for Mayorship.**

Ogden, Utah, July 11.—At the session of the city council last night the application of B. Mahler for a franchise to construct and operate an electric railway line through the city of Ogden was turned down. Mr. Mahler sprung a surprise by consenting to accept a franchise for 50 years instead of a hundred years, as it has been expressed, to grabbing a franchise for a hundred years. All save three of the councilmen, Craig, Chambers and Emmett, voted against granting a franchise in this amended form.

Considerable feeling developed when Mr. Mahler, when given a chance to speak, called attention to some of the inconsistencies of the councilmen voting against his franchise, saying that he was now convinced that some other influence was responsible for the adverse vote.

Councilman J. C. Nye was elected mayor pro tem, to serve during the absence of Mayor Glassmann in Portland. This election was made after Chambers and Randall had declined the honor.

The mayor reappointed J. A. Howell, Miss Wilhelmina Tiesi and Mrs. Jenkins, members of the Carnegie free library board.

Claimes were allowed amounting to \$2,569.

The use of Lester Park pavilion was granted to the Modern Woodmen on eight each week and on Saturdays for the purpose of drilling.

The contract for the construction of the extension of sewer district No. 13 was let to Whittemore Bros. for \$365. The contract for paving Twenty-fourth street from Washington to Grant with asphalt was let to P. J. Moran, the only bidder, for \$3,957.39.

A petition of the Boyle Furniture company asking permission to construct a track from Wall avenue to the company's warehouse was referred to the street committee.

On motion of Craig, the street committee was authorized to apply to the city for the removal of the loose rocks from the bridge north on Washington avenue.

On motion of Craig also, a notice of intention to curb and gutter Washington Avenue from Twelfth street to the Ogden river bridge was adopted.

WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS.

**Tomato Blight Causing Serious Loss—
Special Sheep Tax.**

At the meeting yesterday of the county commissioners it was reported by Chairman Joseph Stanford that some species of blight had attacked the tomato plants at the county infirmary farm and the entire crop will in all likelihood be destroyed. The same blight is attacking the tomatoes elsewhere in the county and will do many thousands of dollars damage.
