Awarding Committee.

Financially the Territorial Fair of 1890 has been a decided success. Upwards of thirty-two thousand people have visited the Exposition since its opening. Undoubtedly the attendance would have been nearly if not quite fifty thousand had the weather been favorable. The public generally are well satisfied with what they have seen, and with the efforts of those under whose auspices the Fair has been held.

In many respects, however, the Exposition was not as good as that of last year. In two features only does it excel, viz., the fine art and live stock departments, both of which are much improved. Many home manufactured articles that in former years have been displayed to good advantage have, for reasons probably best known to the manufacturers, not been exhibited at the Fair which has just closed.

CITY COUNCIL.

The City Council chamber was crowded October 14 with members of the real estate exchange, chamber

of commerce and gentlemen whose presence attested their interest in something that was expected to come before the Council. That something was the Deep Creek railroad question. It was evidently anticipated that the matter of donating Pioneer Square to the road would be voted upon; but, as will appear from the minutes, the committee on public grounds was granted further time in which to make a report upon that matter.

Dallas & Hedges were granted permission to pile building material in two places.

E. H. Davis and others asked to have a bridge placed over the canal near the intersection of Eighth North and First West.

W. J. Tuddenham, in a written communication, called attention to certain work ordered by the former city council to be done on Second Street. Referred to committee on streets.

W. E. Ryan asked to be allowed to purchase lots 1 and 2 in plat G. Referred to committee on public grounds.

E. H. Cook and others asked that the water mains be laid on Fifth Street. Referred to committee on waterworks.

J. W. Haddock and others asked to have Fifth North Street repaired between Third and Fourth West. Referred to committee on streets.

The Mountain Ice and Cold Storage Company asked leave to purchase a certain five acres of land in City Creek Canyon. Referred to committee on public grounds.

A report from the city engineer, accompanied by a letter from David Evans, plumbing inspector, represented that the latter could not possibly perform all the work required of him, on account of the large amount of building going on, and urged that assistance be provided for him. Referred to committee on sanitary regulations.

The city engineer reported in regard to a certain well near Liberty Park, to the effect that it had been sunk to a certain depth at which it produced a flow of 200,000 gallons per day. It stopped flowing and was sunk deeper, when its flow was renewed for a time, but it had stopped again. It was now the deepest well in the neighborhood. Referred to the committee on waterworks.

The same officer reported that the grading for a fence around Capitol Hill reservoir was finished, and that the city's share of the cost was \$69.50. Allowed.

The same officer submitted an amended estimate of the cost of paving with asphalt, and guttering and curbing First East Street, between South Temple and Fourth South streets, including catch basins and conduits as follows:

The report was referred to the committee on streets.

The same officer, to whom had been referred the bill of H. Pembroke for certain printing, reported to the effect that it was all right, and the Council ordered it paid. The amount was \$72.25.

The same officer reported that the plats of three additions had been filed in his office, and he asked leave to confirm the same. Granted.

The quarterly report of the pound-keeper, showing \$32.25 due the city, was filed.

City Auditor Hoag submitted his report, showing the receipts and disbursements during the quarter ending September 30th, the totals being as follows:

Referred to the committee on finance.

The city engineer submitted his report for the same period. It shows that the expenses of the department were \$5625.20, while the receipts were \$1132.90. The report was referred to the committee on streets.

The superintendent of waterworks submitted his report of the expenses of his department for the quarter ending September 30th, as follows:

The committee on fire department, to whom was referred the report of the chief of the department, reported that they had examined the same and found it to be correct. Adopted.

W. H. Ryan, superintendent of waterworks, asked for \$20,000, and Watermaster Harvey asked for \$10,000. Both requests were granted.

The committee on claims recommended that Junius McDonald be paid \$50, for damages done to his house on account of a defective flume. Adopted.

The same committee reported favorably on the bill of Dr. W. F. Anderson for attending a small-pox patient in May, 1889, at the Valley House. Adopted.

The committee on cemetery recommended that the bids sent in for fencing the cemetery grounds be rejected, as the improvements would cost \$1500. The committee recommended, however, that a fence to cost \$500 be constructed around the cemetery lodge. Adopted.

The committee on improvements reported that the lights which were offered by the Sun Vapor Light Company were cheaper, all things considered, than the electric arc lights, but recommended that no contract be made with them till that for the electric lights expires. Adopted.
