GOVERNOR WILL FILL VACANCY

Commissioners Fail to Agree on
Successor to Joseph Stanford.
State Executive to Intervene.

COURT HELD AT FARMINGTON.

Jury Commissioners Appointed—Di-
vorce and Other Suits—Funeral
Of William Krumpnerman.

Ogden, Nov. 29.—Today the time expires for the appointment of a county commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Joseph Stanford and now the matter is up to Gov. Cutler to name his successor. Who it will be is very uncertain. The main fight seems to be between the appointee shall be a man from Ogden City or the county district. It appeared for a time as if John T. Bybee of Riverdale, a very competent and worthy citizen, would receive the position, as he was recommended by many of the most prominent citizens both of the city and county, but whether the demand for the appointment of a city man will be met or not, Commissioner Williams reported at the board of commissioners meeting that he has communicated his views to the governor on the situation. The reason the county commissioners did not appoint some one to fill the vacancy is because they could not agree on a man.

The franchise granted the Utah Light and Power company to extend a line throughout Weber county was accepted in writing by the representatives of the company. Commissioner Williams reported having visited the representatives of the various coal and railroad companies in Salt Lake City concerning the securing of a car load of coal for the distribution among the city and county, and was assured that every effort will be put forth to relieve the distressing conditions.

Supt. Hanson of the county infirmary reported a shortage of water at the infirmary, and that he has had to hire

a man to haul water at the rate of \$2 for every 700 gallons. The commissioners will endeavor to have the water situation improved.

COURT AT FARMINGTON.

Woman Sues Husband for Foreclosure of Mortgage.

Ogden, Nov. 29.—Judge Howell returned last evening from a two days' session of the district court at Farmington. He heard one case where it was wife against husband, the title of the case being Chesney vs. Chesney. Mrs. Chesney testified to loaning her husband \$5,000, for which he gave as security a mortgage to a certain piece of land, which plaintiff asks to be foreclosed. After the hearing of the testimony of both sides the court gave the attorneys an opportunity to file briefs and took the case under advisement. The case of the Honorable Stone Creek Irrigation company vs. Judson et al., suit brought to determine the title to the waters of the creek during the winter months, after hearing the testimony of witnesses for both sides, the court appointed George H. Blood, a water commissioner to go to the stream of water, which runs through Honorable, and regulate the flow of water so that all who are concerned may have all the water necessary for ordinary and domestic purposes, and that if any water is left over the defendants may use it to store in their reservoirs to make ice.

JURY COMMISSIONERS.

Judge Howell has appointed as jury commissioners for the year 1907 W. D. Brown and Joseph Bidwell, who will go through the tax rolls of Ogden city and Weber county and select between 300 and 400 names of men who are to serve as trial jurors.

The court also fixed the bond of county commissioners for the ensuing two years at \$10,000.

SUIT TO FORECLOSE.

Dewitt Spence has commenced foreclosure proceedings in the district court against Lorenzo Marriott, Jr., et

al. The plaintiff alleges that Feb. 9, 1904, the defendants borrowed from him \$500 on a promissory note, giving as security a mortgage on certain land. That the money has not been paid back, and plaintiff now prays for a decree foreclosing the mortgage, and that the property be sold to satisfy the judgment.

SUIT TO QUIT TITLE.

Isabel Boyle and William Wallace Boyle have each commenced proceedings in the courts against Sarah E. Boyle Bult, administratrix of the estate of Robert Bruce Boyle, deceased, et al. to quit title to certain property which plaintiffs claim to own as heirs to deceased's estate, but that the defendants claim to have a certain interest in the land.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.

Suit for divorce has been filed in the district court by Mattie M. West against Harold E. West. The complaint sets forth that the couple were married at Ogden City, Dec. 24, 1904, that two children are living as issue of said wedlock, that the defendant has failed and refused to provide for either his wife or children, a decree of divorce—custody of the children and such other relief as the court may deem just is prayed for.

Many relatives and friends gathered at the Fifth ward meetinghouse yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock to pay a tribute of respect to the memory of William Krumpnerman, whose young life was cut off so unexpectedly Sunday night. A large number of students of the high school attended and six of his fellow students acted as pall bearers. Bishop's Counselor H. C. Jacobs presided at the services. A girls' chorus rendered some sweet musical selections and Mr. Chamberlain sang a solo entitled "Come Unto Me," and Mrs. Elizabeth Culley sang "Abide With Me." Many comforting remarks were made by Elders T. A. Shreve, J. W. F. Walker, and H. C. Jacobs, who spoke of the deceased as a young man of noble characteristics, pure in thought and action, loving and kind, who had a bright future before him. The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful. Interment took place in the city cemetery, Elder T. B. Wheelwright dedicating the grave.
