MCCARTHY IS
SET AT LIBERTY.

Man Charged With the Murder
Of Joseph Mulholland Found
Not Guilty by a Jury.

SHOOTING WAS JUSTIFIABLE.

Had Been Pursued by Deputy Constable and Threatened With Death if He Did Not Leave Town.

(Special to the "News.")
Caliente, Nev., Oct. 25.—William McCarthy, charged with the killing of Joseph Mulholland at Las Vegas Sept. 1, came to trial at Pioche before Hon. Judge Brown and the following named jurors: O. B. Landon, Ed. F. Fruendthal, Arthur Gentry, W. O. Huston, H. P. Heminger, Dave Jenkins, Carl Pervman, F. E. Edwards, George Connolly and C. E. Lytle. The state was represented by Prosecuting Atty. Sanders and the defense had M. M. Warner of the firm of Warner & Davis of Salt Lake and Atty. Horsey of Pioche.

STORY OF THE KILLING.

At the time of the shooting newspaper reports had it that the killing was unprovoked and a cold-blooded murder, but the evidence detailed by witnesses both for the state and the defense disclosed an entirely different state of facts. Mulholland, the deceased, was a deputy constable at Las Vegas. On the night of the killing he had been drinking heavily and on account of his drunken condition he so far forgot himself as to assault McCarthy with a revolver, frequently pointing it at him and threatening to kill McCarthy, and without cause or justification looked him up in the town jail, which was not a fit place for a human being to be put into. Later he liberated McCarthy with an injunction to leave town and never speak of the occurrence and saying to McCarthy that if he did not leave town that night he would kill him in the morning.

TRIED TO AVOID TROUBLE.

The evidence showed plainly that McCarthy tried to avoid trouble and begged Mulholland not to follow him, but to let him alone. The evidence further showed that Mulholland had told others that he was going to kill McCarthy before morning. About six in the morning Mulholland followed McCarthy into Arthur Fry's saloon and made an effort to draw his gun, when McCarthy being prepared and watching for the assault, fired three shots into Mulholland, only one of which would have proved fatal.

CASE HOTLY CONTESTED.

The case was hotly contested on both sides. It was submitted to the jury at 5 p. m. Tuesday and the jury promptly returned a verdict of not guilty. To the people who have read the reports of the case heretofore published, the verdict will be a surprise, but to those who attended the trial and heard the evidence the verdict was only as they predicted it would be.
