EGAN'S FIRST MOVE.

Will He Engage in Battle Royal With the Union Pacific?

By cutting with the Rio Grande.

Appearance of War in the Death to Salt Off the Union Pacific. Main Line.

In view of recent developments the following statement from Denver may be regarded as of great importance not only in railway circles, but in the trading and commercial points. There has been a rumor all the time that the policy of the separate Short Line reversion would be to break close traffic connection with the Union Pacific and combine with the Rio Grande and connections, since at its source, the Union Pacific main line could not but be seriously crippled, hence the strenuous efforts to prevent the separation which has been entered in the three jurisdictions controlling the Short Line route, and which has been granted in two. In the light of probabilities in connection with the new management, this dispute has paramount interest in railway circles hereabouts.

Denver, June 1.—Col. D. C. Dwyer, of the Rio Grande Western, was here yesterday summoned to Salt Lake for a conference with Receiver Egan of the Great Salt Lake, and during the day he was at the residence of the Short Line, where he was staying for the night.
