John F. Shafroth, Democrat, claims that he has been elected congressman-at-large, but the returns are so incomplete that the result cannot be positively stated. Robert W. Bonyrge, Republican, is elected in the First district and Herschel M. Hogg, Republican, in the Second.

District judges: Howell, (R.), 46; More than a score of women and children today were overcome by smoke, and nearly five families were driven from their apartments in a big tenement house on Boston Road in the northeastern part of the city, by a fire that started near the heating apparatus in the basement. Smoke pouring up from the basement filled the halls and when the frightened tenants rushed from their rooms many were overtaken. Seven persons were found lying in a heap in one dark hallway and were carried out by firemen. On every floor unconscious women and children were found but all recovered as soon as taken into the outer air. The loss was small.

OUTRAGES ON JEWS.

Russian Police Let Rioters Pillage Their Homes.

Gomel, Russia, Nov. 10.—Police Capt. Chornoloupsky, at today's sitting of the court which is trying the persons accused of being responsible for the rioting of September 28, testified that the Jews provoked the riot. The Counsel for the Jews and the prosecutor asked the court to recall Chief of Police Raevsky, but the request was declined.

Several witnesses testified that Police Capt. Chornoloupsky allowed the rioters to pillage Jewish shops, but that he threatened to order the police
