# AT BELGRADE

The Revolution Was Started by the Booming of Cannon.

WAS PLANNED WEEKS AGO.

Secret Committees Organized in the Country and Worked in Co-operation with the Army.

Belgrade, Servia, June 11.-The booming of a cannon at 2 o'clock this morning was the signal for a revolution in Servia, which shortly afterwards was followed by the assassination of King Alexander, Queen Draga and several members of the ministry.

When the signal gun was fired the soldiers surrounded the homes of the cabinet ministers and the palace at the same time and the massacre was inaugurated.

According to the best available in-formation obtainable, the crime was carried out by members of the Sixth infantry, under command of Cols. Mischich and Machin. The latter is a brother-in-law of the late Queen Draga and is minister of public works in the new cabinet.

Some of the other persons killed were surprised in their houses simultaneously with the attack on the palace.

King Alexander was shot to death, and as the revolting soldiers entered the royal bedroom the king selzed a revolver and shot the 'queen, killing her. The cause of the revolution was the suspension of the Servian consti-tution some time since tution some time since.

The revolution was planned weeks go. Secret committees were organized in the country and worked in co-opera-tion with the army. The leaders of the revolution are said to have been the new ministers of justice and finance, respectively, M. Schlokovics and M. Velikevics, and the Sixth regiment of infantry, garrisoning Belgrade was garrisoning Belgrade, was infantry, designated to carry out the plot. It was originally intended that the

plot should be executed later, but fears that the new Servian parliament would settle the question of the succession to the throne hastened matters. Col. Naumovis, the adjutant of the

king, was entrusted with the execution of the plans. While on duty at 11 o'clock last night Naumovis burst in the door leading to the sleeping apartments of the royal couple with a bomb and then entered, accompanied by Mischich and a number of junior offi-cers. Previously the palace guard had been overpowered and its commander.

The career of the Obrenovitch dynasty was thus closed in the early hours of this morning, the same day of the year on which Prince Michael was the year on which Prince Michaei was murdered 35 years ago in the park of Topschider near Belgrade. Today a requiem mass was being sung in mem-ory of Prince Michael, and now the last of his race, together with all connected with the dynasty by his unfortunate marriage, lies in a bier in the palace.
