

THE RUSSIAN LAND QUESTION

Commission Accepts Proposition To Appropriate State, Crown, Church and Monastery Lands.

MATTER OF EXPROPRIATION

Is a Source of Trouble and no Satisfactory Method Has Been Suggested.

St. Petersburg, July 8.—The first paragraph of the proposed agrarian law, viz., the augmentation of the lands of the peasants by the appropriation of all state and crown domains and church and monastery lands, has been accepted by the commission of the lower house with practically unanimity. The commission have now looked horns with the mode of expropriation, and the method of disposal of private estates, and the end is not yet in sight.

The determination to expropriate church lands which, in distinction from the great estates owned by the monasteries, are scattered like the lands of the nobles throughout the country and support the local clergy, will cause complications. Such action would deprive the parish priests of the principal part of their security emoluments and necessitate an equivalent from some other source.

A correspondent of the Associated Press has just completed a tour of the provinces of Samara and Saratov. He reports that the drought is finally broken, but the rains have come too late to save the crop and help the peasants, who are in a pitiable condition. Their cattle have either been sold or are starving in the fields.

The government relief granaries were completely emptied during last year's famine. The present agrarian disorders, which can be expected to grow worse, are due largely to the necessity of preserving their lives and save from starvation the remainder of their crops. These disorders have reached the highest pitch in the province of Voronezh, where the troops and Cossacks, although in considerable force, are practically helpless and on the defensive.

Many peasants have been killed or wounded in desperate attacks on military patrols and the rural guards. According to a telegram received here from Tambor, peasants on the estate of the Princess Barinskaya attacked a commissary and a posse of rural police. The commissary and four policemen were seriously wounded. In another section of the province of Tambor a body of peasants, armed with pitchforks and spades, resisted a squadron of dragoons. Because of these resistances the troops fired, killing three peasants and wounding many others.

At Krasnodar, southeast of Tiflis, a head-on fight has occurred between Cossacks and an armed guard of peasants, with the result that seven were killed on both sides.

There has been a fatal encounter at Krasnodar, in the province of Podolsk, between rich peasants and poor peasants. The poor men were incensed because the rich men had sent a telegram to the lower house protesting against the proposed distribution of land. In this fighting one of the wealthy peasants killed four and seriously wounded several of the poorer men.

There have been grave disorders on the estate of Minister of Agriculture Samoylov, in Tiflis province. The representative of the Associated Press at Rostov reports that the crop conditions in the Kuban and Don districts are above the average.

Agrarian disorders among the Cossack agricultural population are not reported, although there has been some ferment among the military levies having to do police duty.

NEGRO WIFE MURDERER.

Indianapolis, July 8.—Aaron Morton, a negro, shot and killed his wife on a crowded street today and was pursued several blocks by a mob of 1,000 persons bent on lynching him. Morton succeeded in reaching a fire station, whence he was given protection. Just as the mob was preparing for an assault on the building a detail of police rescued the negro and he was taken to the city jail. During the pursuit a number of the mob fired at the murderer.

YOUNG ASTOR ARRIVES.

New York, July 8.—Waldorf Astor, son of William W. Astor of London, arrived here today on the steamship Celtic, accompanied by his bride, who formerly was Mrs. Natalie Langhorne Shaw of Virginia. Mr. and Mrs. Astor after a few days spent in New York, will go to Maine and then to Mrs. Astor's former home in Virginia. Mr. Astor said that his father was in good health when he left home and he did not view with concern the cable reports of his illness.

CLOUDBURST DOES MUCH DAMAGE IN DENVER.

Denver, July 8.—Cloudbursts and lightning did considerable damage in this section of the state today.

In Denver a wall of water 10 feet high came down Dry creek in the western part of the city, carrying away footbridges and damaging the bridge of the Denver & Intermountain railroad. Two boys, 3 years old, were fishing under the bridge and were rescued with difficulty.

In Boulder a wall of water six feet high came out of Sunshine canyon and spread itself over Pearl street and other streets in that city. A mile of the Sunshine railroad was destroyed and considerable damage was done in the city.

At Florence late this afternoon a burst in Oak creek undermined a big bridge at Rockvale. A heavy storm destroyed telephone connections between Florence and Pueblo.

Pay Powers, aged 17, was killed by lightning near Colorado Springs.

The Carnegie library in this city was struck by a bolt during the storm, but no damage was reported.

A BAD COLLISION.

Elevated Express Train and Trolley Car Bump Into Each Other.

New York, July 8.—Fire following a collision on Coney Island tonight between the elevated railroad express train and a local trolley car caused a panic in which six persons were injured, three severely, by being trampled upon. Bound for Coney Island and going at high speed, the express had just turned the curve in the road near the sea beach palace when just ahead the motorman saw the local stationary and passengers alighting from it. He was unable to stop the train, and it crashed into the local. By the force of the impact a fuse of the local was blown out and flames threatened the car. The passengers fought fiercely with each other to escape.

LEATHER WORKERS.

Advise Members Not to Vote for Candidates Not Pledged on Labor Matters.

New York, July 8.—The Amalgamated Leather Workers of America today elected Joseph T. Gillihan, Lowell, Mass., general president. Financial support was voted to locals making a demand for a nine-hour working day and resolutions were adopted advising officers and members to participate actively in political affairs and to support no candidate who refused to pledge himself on labor matters.

CHINESE VOLUNTEERS PARADE.

Seanghai, July 8.—An unprecedented and spectacular scene was witnessed here today when 4,000 Chinese volunteers, who have been drilling assiduously for the past few months, paraded through the flag-decked streets of the metropolis. The men were dressed in khaki and presented a smart appearance. Only the officers wore swords. After the parade the soldiers were entertained at the yamen of the taotai.

WIPING OUT NATIVES.

Durban, Natal, July 8.—Natal troops have completely surrounded and defeated a rebel body in the Umvoti district. Seven hundred and forty-seven rebels were killed and few escaped.

SHOOTS WIFE, KILLS HIMSELF.

San Francisco, July 8.—In a domestic quarrel last night E. V. Murphy, a refugee at the Presidio, shot and slightly wounded his wife, and took his own life by shooting off the top of his head.

CZAR AND KAISER TO MEET.

London, July 8.—The correspondent in St. Petersburg of the Tribune telegraphs that a meeting between Emperor William and Emperor Nicholas is expected next month.

BIG LOAN FOR TOKIO.

London, July 8.—In a dispatch from Tokio the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says the municipality of Tokio will contract a loan of £5,000,000 at 5 per cent, issue price 96, with a four-year syndicate. The purpose of the loan is the redemption of the water-works loan bonds and the bonds of other municipal undertakings. The issuing houses are the Kokohama Specie bank, London, and two London banks.

THE DEWEY NEARLY AT MANILA.

Manila, July 8.—The steel floating drydock Dewey is due to reach Manila July 12, when she will have covered a distance of something like 12,000 miles. The Dewey, which is destined to dock the largest ships of American naval force in the far east, started from Solomon's island, M.

FAMOUS DAY DIVORCE CASE

Idaho Supreme Court Orders Judge Morgan to Call in Another Judge.

DEFENDANT MUST PAY COSTS.

Effort May be Made to Secure Change of Venue for Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone.

Boise, Ida., July 8.—The supreme court has reversed the order of Judge Morgan of the district court for Shoshone county, refusing to grant a change of venue in the famous Day divorce case, and instructed him either to call in another judge or send the case into another district. It also orders Eugene R. Day, the defendant in the case, to pay into court the sum of \$1,500 to meet the costs of his wife in prosecuting the suit. Mr. Day is one of the owners of the Hercules mine.

In this case the plaintiff, Agnes Loretta Day, applied for a change of venue on the ground that the judge presiding was prejudiced. A large number of affidavits were filed in support of the motion. Counter affidavits to the number of 65 were filed by the defendant. After presentation of the matter, the judge refused to grant the application, taking the ground that prejudice of the judge is not a cause under the statute for change of venue. The statute simply provides that a judge is prohibited from acting when he is a party in interest, when he is related to either of the litigants or when he has been an attorney in the action.

The plaintiff relied upon the clause of the constitution, section 18, article 1, which provides that right and justice shall be administered by the courts "without sale, without prejudice or without delay."

It is held by the supreme court that this clause is self-executing. The statute was enacted before the constitution was adopted, but even were it otherwise the section of the constitution would govern.

In conclusion the opinion says: "It is contended that affidavits on the part of the appellant do not show bias and prejudice and that if so they have been fully met by other affidavits showing the high and honorable character of the trial judge. It must be conceded that judges are susceptible to bias and prejudice the same as other men, and we think the record shows such a state of affairs or condition that it would bring discredit upon the judiciary to permit a trial before the present judge, and therefore conclude that another judge must be called to try the case, as may be done under the provisions of section 12, article 5 of the constitution of Idaho. It will no doubt be less expensive to both parties to try the case in Shoshone county."

The district judge is ordered to change the place of trial, or call in such other judge.

An interesting collateral effect of the decision is that it will likely bring on a still more determined effort on the part of the defense in the Moyer-Haywood-Pettibone case to secure a change of venue on the allegation that Judge Smith is prejudiced.

FIRE CAUSED PANIC.

Accident to Moving Picture Machine Started the Trouble.

Atlantic City, N. J., July 8.—A slight fire in a moving picture machine in the theater on Young's pier tonight started a panic among the several hundred persons who were in the auditorium and a number of persons were injured in the rush for the exits.

When the moving picture machine took fire there was a puff of smoke and then darkness. Some one cried "fire" and a rush was made for the doors. Women were knocked down and children were separated from their parents, but all escaped from the building without serious injury so far as known.

INFATUATED LOVER SHOOT HIS LADY LOVE'S UNCLE.

Seattle, July 8.—G. Monte Emory, a distinguished lawyer of this city, was shot down and probably fatally wounded at his residence, at Denny way and Third avenue, in this city, last night, by Chester Thompson, a university student and son of a well-known attorney.

The cause was infatuation for Charlotte Whittlesey, niece of the stricken man, who had denied his attentions and had asked her uncle that her admirer be denied an admittance should he seek to see her.

Thompson is a student at the University of Washington and a son of Will H. Thompson, former attorney for the Great Northern Railway company, while the stricken man is one of the most prominent lawyers of the state.

Justice Emory was shot down on his own threshold, while attempting to restrain Thompson from entering the house. Thompson hurled himself into a room occupied by two small children of the man he shot and refused to surrender himself into custody until the arrival of his father, two hours after the shooting occurred.

ACCIDENT ON SANTA FE.

Train Partially Derailed, Fireman Being Scalded to Death.

Flagstaff, Ariz., July 8.—Passenger train No. 4, the limited on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, was partially derailed at 2 o'clock this morning at a point four miles west of here. None of the passengers was injured. Ed Pillsbury, the fireman, was caught under the engine and scalded to death. Engineer Goldworthy was scalded about the legs and was injured in the chest.

The accident was caused by a front truck on the engine leaving the track. The engine turned over on its side and a composite car and dining car slipped over the crest of an embankment. The three Pullman sleepers remained on the track. The presence of mind of Engineer Goldworthy probably prevented additional fatalities. He applied the brakes and remained at his post until the engine started to turn over, when he jumped.

Topeka, Kan., July 8.—According to advices received here, the only passenger injured in the Santa Fe wreck at Flagstaff was Mrs. Roberts of Oakland, Cal., who sustained a severe sprain of the ankle.

GRODNO'S GOVERNOR RECALLED.

St. Petersburg, July 8.—Gov. Kuchera of Grodno, within whose jurisdiction the town of Bialystok is situated, has been recalled. Serious allegations regarding the recent massacres at Bialystok have been brought against him.

MURDERER ELECTROCUTED.

Boston, July 8.—John Schildrofski, a Lithuanian of Brockton, was electrocuted at the state prison at Charlestown this morning for the murder of his wife at Belmont, July 12, 1905. Following the murder, the husband bought a ticket for California. Schildrofski's defense was that he had been drinking.

EMPEROR WILLIAM ARRIVES AT TRONDHJEM.

Trondhjem, July 8.—Emperor William arrived here this evening on the Hamburg. King Haakon immediately went on board, and the two monarchs embraced cordially, kissing each other several times. They remained together in the state cabin for 40 minutes. Afterwards they went ashore and drove to the palace, amid the enthusiastic acclamations of the crowd. At the palace the German emperor was greeted by Queen Maud and the little Crown Prince Olaf was presented to him. At the end of the visit Emperor William returned to the Hamburg.

He came ashore later in the evening and attended the gala dinner at the palace. The press of Norway comments on the importance of this visitor.

THE MEXICAN GATEWAY.

Used by Many Immigrants to Get Into United States.

Mexico City, July 8.—A large number of immigrants from Europe, classified as "Turks" but often Armenians and Arabs, have recently been arriving by German and Spanish steamers at Vera Cruz. A large portion of them come here and go north into the interior to work on railways, and not a few of them eventually cross over into the United States. During the past six months several thousand so-called Turks have reached this country. Many of them are said to be of the class likely to be rejected at American ports, and take this way of getting entrance to the United States.

GIFT FOR YOUNG PRINCE.

Berlin, July 8.—In recognition of the fact that the youngest member of the Hohenzollern family, the infant son of Crown Princess Frederick William, was born on the Fourth of July, the American colony has resolved to present him with an ornamental silver cup, embellished with the Stars and Stripes and the American eagle. The condition of the crown princess and the baby is most satisfactory.
