

## CONTEST OVER SACKVILLE PEERAGE

Case Hinges on Legitimacy of Ernest Henri Battiste West, The Claimant.

MOTHER A SPANISH DANCER.

No Attempt Made to Deny That Lord Sackville Lived With Josephine de Ortega as His Wife.

Madrid, March 1.—The case of Ernest Henri Battiste West, claimant to the Sackville peerage and estates, against Lionel Edward Sackville West, to whom the estates have passed, opened in court in this city today. The court was presided over by Judge Marquies. The case hinges upon the legitimacy of the claimant.

The late Lord Sackville, uncle of the present holder of the estates, was British minister to Washington in 1888. Ernest West is the natural son of Lord Sackville, who, while he was in Madrid, formed an irregular alliance with a Spanish dancer named Josephine de Ortega as his wife and that he formally legitimized his children by her, but Lord Sackville will contend that the daughter in 1881, 18 years prior to the birth of Ernest, contracted a marriage with a Spaniard named Olivia and that consequently Lord Sackville's legal recognition of his children is nullified. He will produce in court a copy of a register of a church in Madrid, purporting to show the marriage of Ernest's mother to Olivia. These copies were procured in 1900, and the claimant is asking the court to be satisfied with the register was tampered with in 1901.

The present case is a criminal action against a church employee named Hollier, a relative of Josephine, and a third man, who are charged with attesting the church record of the marriage of Josephine to Olivia. The public prosecutor and the attorney for Lionel Sackville-West have been asking the condemnation of the accused to imprisonment for 10 years. The handwriting experts agree that the church record has been tampered with, but they differ as to what those changes indicate. Many handwriting experts have been summoned by both sides.

The claimant purposes to produce also the dying declaration of Josephine, affirming that she was the legitimate wife of the late Lord Sackville and that her children were recognized, supporting this contention with an array of private letters. The prosecution will insist upon the validity of the marriage of Josephine and Lord Sackville; that Lord Sackville, when he assumed the peerage in 1885, declared that he was unmarried and that the municipal archives contain a legal transcript of the marriage of Josephine and Olivia.

U. S. Supreme Court Holds Plaintiff Has No Cause of Action.


Washington, March 1.—The supreme court of the United States today reversed the decision of the United States court of appeals for the Second circuit, directing the court for the Southern district of New York to hear the case of J. Wilcox Brown vs. the Equitable Assurance society, involving charges of mismanagement.

entitled neither to an accounting nor to the appointment of a receiver.

Mr. Brown claimed to represent himself and the 6,000 other policyholders. He asked for the appointment of a receiver and a general accounting, alleging that all the policyholders were entitled to participate in the division of the surplus. He contended that the distribution of profits had not been as extensive as it should be.

He charged, indeed, that \$10,000,000 more than was necessary had been retained in the treasury of the society and that the maintenance of so large a sum there had resulted in extravagant salaries and other wasteful expenditures. The circuit court dismissed the bill on a demurrer, but the court of appeals held that as the bill alleged frauds, the company must make answer or allow the case to be decided on its merits.

## GREAT FIRE IN RENO, NEVADA

Starting in Arcade Hotel Soon Communicated to Palace Hotel and Gambling House.

LOSS WILL BE NEAR \$100,000.

No Attempt Made to Save Contents of the Buildings Except Fifty Barrels of Whisky.

Reno, Nev., March 1.—Fire starting about 3 o'clock today, it is supposed, from an overheated fire in an upper room of the Arcade hotel, on Commercial Row, quickly communicated to the Palace hotel and gambling house, owned by Jim May, on the corner of Commercial Row and Center street, and in an hour the old landmark and notorious gaming place was level with the street and the Arcade hotel a mass of smoldering ruins.

The Washoe saloon and restaurant, adjoining the Arcade on the west, was completely wrecked and contents destroyed.

The loss still approach \$100,000 very closely, partly covered by insurance. Mitchell & Sherman restaurants in the Palace, loss \$15,000, with no insurance, their policy lapsing less than a month ago.

Strenuous work on the part of the firemen confined the blaze within the three places mentioned. For a time it was feared that the Overland hotel, opposite the Palace, and the Golden block, immediately adjoining on the east, would go.

No attempt was made to save any of the contents of the buildings except 50 barrels of whisky in the Palace cellar. Water was turned into the cellar and the barrels were quickly submerged.

Several men were more or less hurt by flying boards and falling brick. One fireman was painfully bruised by being knocked down a flight of stairs by being struck by the full force of a hose.

Four unknown men made a thrilling rescue of Miss Pearl Foley, who had been asleep in one of the rooms of the palace. After throwing several articles of no value from the window, she collapsed, and lay helpless on the sill, while the flames whirled behind her. Before a ladder could be raised, the young men rushed forward and, swinging one upon the other, reached Miss Foley and conveyed her to the street through a flame-filled stairway. Their act was wildly cheered by the big crowd.

The Palace gambling house was one of the oldest and most noted of Reno in the entire west. It has been the scene of many spectacular plays, one of the most noted being made by its present owner, Jim May. One night, two years ago, after a run of bad luck, May finally put a \$1,000 bill on No. 4 on the roulette wheel, and won \$35,000. In lieu of the cash he was given an interest in the games, since which time he has acquired the building.

## COLORED COLLECTOR OF CHARLESTON, S. C., RESIGNS

Charleston, S. C., March 1.—Dr. William C. Crum today resigned as collector of customs at this port, to take effect March 4. Thus ends the situation which has threatened to cause President-elect Taft much embarrassment.

No appointment made by President Roosevelt has given rise to more discussion than that of Dr. Crum, who is a negro. A hard fight against his confirmation was made by Senator Tillman and others when he was first named in 1907, and within a few weeks following his reappointment Senator Tillman conducted a successful filibuster against confirmation.

Dr. Crum says no pressure has been brought to bear upon him now to cause him to resign, but that he does so in part because he wishes to save Mr. Taft, for whom he entertains great respect, from any possible embarrassment as to his reappointment and chiefly because he feels that he has been especially identified with President Roosevelt's administration. He wishes to retire with his chief.

## INAUGURAL PARADE.

For First Time Wives of President and Vice President Will Participate.

Washington, March 1.—For the first time in history the wives of the president and vice president will participate in the inaugural parade. Mrs. Taft and Mrs. Sherman will join their husbands when they leave the Capitol after the inauguration ceremony and proceed with them to the White House.

## A WANTON MURDER.

Holston, Mont., March 1.—A pistol to the forehead from Le and over shot Charles Horen, a well-known business man, was shot down and probably fatally injured yesterday afternoon by a supposedly insane Italian. The man had met and exchanged the compliments of the day when without warning the Italian wheeled and fired upon Horen. Two bullets lodging in his spine, the Italian was captured by a posse and turned over to the county officials.

## SECY. STRAUS DOESN'T UNDERSTAND QUESTION

Washington, March 2.—Confessing that he did not know what the inquiry meant, Secy. Straus of the department of commerce and labor today asked the house of representatives to explain the question. ## SARGENT CASE AROUSES INTEREST IN PARIS

Paris, March 1.—The newspapers are deeply absorbed with the case of the Englishman, Sargent, and his wife, said to be an American, arrested at Asnieres, charged with the gross ill-treatment of four children whom they had adopted, and claim that the developments indicate the probability of a great scandal.

The chief energy of the authorities is being directed to tracing the parents of the children. They announce that Mrs. Sargent claims that the eldest child, who was so brutally beaten that she is now in a hospital, is named Mary Ann Edgeworth, and that she was born October 15, 1899, in Newark, N. J. The police say the woman insists that she is the daughter of a Frenchman named Savin, and an American woman, who now lives in the United States, and that they forward her each year \$5,000.

Before the magistrate today the woman declared she had not maltreated the children—that she had only chastised them when punishment was necessary. There were violent scenes in the courtroom between the accused couple and their servants, the latter charging the woman with being a "prejudicial monster."

## ANOTHER TANGLE IN YEKES ART GALLERY

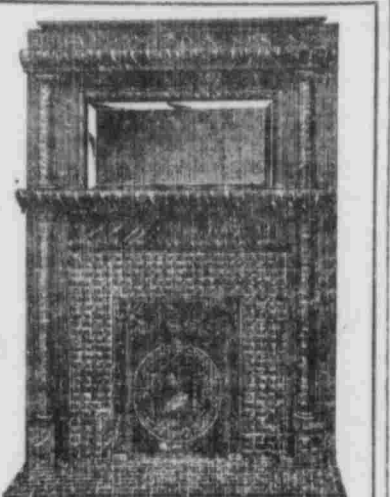
