LOCAL BRIEFS.

Morals—The Y. M. C. A. will have a tent at the National Guard encampment south of the city.

Picnic—The annual excursion of the Apollo lodge of the Danish Brotherhood is being held at Vandamere today.

Reunion—The Hawkeye club will meet this evening, in Judge Armstrong's courtroom, where all Iowa people are invited to be present.

Home—Joseph Geoghegan and two daughters have returned from a pleasant European trip, during which they visited the ancestral home in Tipperary, Ireland.

Convalescent—Charlotte M. Vincent of 561 Pacific avenue, is sufficiently convalescent from an operation for appendicitis to enter the L. D. S. hospital to return home.

Delivered—Five carloads of structural steel for the New Mission theater on east Third South street, arrived yesterday afternoon, so that the work can be rushed to completion.

Glanders—The local bureau of animal industry has instructions from Washington to co-operate with the Utah state veterinarian in the suppression of glanders among horses and tuberculosis among cattle throughout the state. A campaign will be started within 30 days.

Insurance—The Sovereign Fire Assurance company of Canada has filed with the secretary of state, a copy of its articles of incorporation seeking permission to enter Utah for fire insurance business with George B. Squires as its agent for this state with its principal office in this city.

Raided—In a raid made on an "opium joint," in a rooming-house on Second South street, last night by Officers Ripley and Curran, Frank Wilson, Harry Rains and Simon Jole were arrested and their "several" layouts confiscated. The men will be held to answer the charge of frequenting an opium den.

Visiting—Rev. Dr. T. C. Hilt of Denver, formerly a resident of this city in charge of the Methodist district of the state, is visiting E. A. Dix, 1111 Second avenue, accompanied by his daughter Lois, en route east from Seattle. He served through the Civil war in the Ninth Ohio cavalry, and was with Sherman on his march to the sea.

Remained—A. R. Uhrman, whose fondness for the poppy leads him far away from the desire to work, was picked up last night by the police after he had been given a "clonker." Uhrman was released before the court on a vagrancy charge and was given a suspended sentence on the promise that he would leave town. He will remain with Chief Barlow, now for 100 days until he is appointed a trustee, at least.

Census—Telegraph dispatches from Washington are to the effect that Hugh A. McMillan, late state legislator and representative in the last session of the legislature, is to be appointed supervisor of the 15th census of Utah. McMillan has received no official notice of his appointment, but he says that he will accept it if it is tendered to him. The recommendation for the appointment is by the Utah delegation at Washington.

PREVIEW DISPLAY AT TABERNACLE

Famous Building Handsomely Decorated in Honor of Grand Army Veterans—Beautiful Effects.

Excepting the platform which is to be built over the stand in the tabernacle sometime after the services Sunday, everything in the way of decorating the building in honor of the G. A. R. veterans is now completed. In addition to the new electric display in front of the organ, the decorations include four immense flags and a great deal of bunting, which has been arranged in beautiful though simple style.

The four flags cover all of the immense dome, the fields of each with stars being placed in the corner of the building. The flags are each 100 by 200 feet, the stars being 5 1/2 feet high and the stripes 7 1/2 feet wide, though, owing to the great size of the building, it is hard to realize they are more than half that size. Around the gallery has been placed several hundred feet of bunting, six or eight feet wide, in which the stripes alternate uniformly with the field of blue and the white stars, making a beautiful effect. The lights in front of the organ show the word "Welcome" and the letters "G. A. R." at the top. Underneath them is the star, and the outline of the beehive which it encloses, is shown with small red lamps. Inside of and around the beehive the movements of the bees are represented by a number of small electric lamps which present a scintillating effect as the electric current is turned on and off each of them in succession by clock work. Immediately under the star is the word "Utah," making a brilliant showing from all parts of the building.

In the Assembly hall, where the campfires will be held, festoons of red, white and blue have been run from the center of the ceiling to the windows. The gallery has also been draped similarly to the Tabernacle gallery, and the pulpit has been covered with bunting. At the west end of the south side of the Tabernacle grounds will be decorated, and the word "Welcome" will be placed in the center panel. The main walks in the grounds will also be decorated with festoons from the lamps into the trees and flags, so placed as to give the appearance of two main corridors from the south gate, one going north to the east end of the grounds, and the other extending towards the Assembly hall doors. The work was designed and accomplished by Chas. Peterson.
