The Fitzjohn Porter Case.

WEST POINT, N. Y., 16.—The

hearing in the Academy Lib-

rary to-day. The first witness

called was Chas. O. Williams, ad-

vised counsel of the Academy.

He is now a lawyer at Richmond,

Va. He testified, as have the other

witnesses, as to Longstreet's posi-

tion in front of Fort Mifflin, on the

29th, and gave details. He also

corroborated other witnesses in say-

ing it was only artillery firing on

the 29th, except that Hood had sev-

eral fights near sundown, but he

made no reference to any general

engagements. In reply to General

Schofield, he said the principal fir-

ing was the artillery when Hood

and Evans were engaged. Mr.

Wilcox, of Washington, command-

ing a division of Longstreet's corps,

and numbering about 5,000, was

in the front of the line on the 29th,

and his troops were in excellent con-

dition on the 29th of August. His

division did not fire a shot that

day, which showed that there could

not have been a combined engage-

ment as was emphatically stated

by Pope in his dispatch to Halleck.

Robert Thompson, President of the

Philadelphia Railroad Company,

who was lieutenant colonel of the

15th regiment of volunteers, Pat-

terson's brigade, Hoozer's division,

testified that the night of the 29th

of August was a very dark one, and

it would have been very difficult

to make a march from Warrington

to the front, starting at 3 o'clock

in the morning. This evidence

was introduced to corroborate

the other witnesses whose testi-

mony thus far has inclined to back

up Fort Mifflin in his delay in re-

sponding to Pope's orders to march

at 1 o'clock that night. He thought

nothing could be gained by start-

ing before daylight. He did not

know of a general engagement on

the 29th. He was in the line when

he received orders to march at 1 o'clock

on the night of the 29th he would

have tried it, for he always obeyed

orders.
