## If the Democrats of Illinois Accept Him Cannot Endorse The Nebraskan.

## REPUDIATES ENDORSEMENT

Would Have All Aspirants for Office Announce Opposition to the Committeeman.

Chicago, Sept. 4 .-- William J. Bryan, as the guest of the local Democracy, delivered today within eight hours two addresses. His first speech, which was made at a luncheon given in his honor by members of the Iroquois club, dealt entirely with the political issues and economic questions of the day. The second speech, which was made at a harmuet given in his honor by the Jefferson club, was devoted to National Committeeman Roger C. Sullivan of Illinois, whose resignation Mr. Bryan demanded but who was endorsed by the recentistate convention, which also de-clared in favor of Mr. Bryan as the next Democratic nominee for president. Mr. Bryan not only scored Sullivan and his political methods unmercifully informed the Democrats present that if they accepted Mr. Sullivan the could not endorse him in any way. Re informed them emphatically that would have none of the approval of the Democrats of Illinois and that he repudiated their recent endorsement of

#### GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.

in his afternoon address Mr. Bryan Aid regarding his recent utterances in New York on government ownership of the railways;

'I stated what I thought with the expectation that everybody else would exercise the same, freedom in the discussion of the question. I was led my conclusions by the corruption of the people of the United States by the railways as I have seen it. In my judgment we have no more corrupting influence in American politics than the railways. They have corrupted the people by the pass. I have known co have known judges to be elected by railroads, and I have reached the conclusion that this corruption cannot be eliminated until these natural monop olics become the property of the gov. ernment. I am opposed to centraliza-tion and because I believe that the states can best do that which concerns the state alone, because I believe in the doctrine of self government, therefore I prefer that, instead of having all the ratiroads owned by the federal government, we should have the local lines owned by state governments and only the trunk lines owned by the federal government.

'If you say that I have no right to interfere in the politics of this state, I reply that I am simply applying to Illinois a principle which I believe ought to be applied universally. I do not regard it as a compliment to be endorsed for the presidency by a convention which endorsed Mr. Sullivan. I told them in advance that I did

not want an endorsement under such circumstances, and I repudiate it. If my nomination for any office depended upon that endorsement I would not accept it. Hence, the company intends to build others of the same type and esablish a regular weekly service to New York of that class of vessels.
