### AN ARCTIC PEOPLE HAD NEVER SEEN A WHITE MAN.

Victory, B. C., Nov. 8.-Interesting details regarding the finding of a peo-ple who had never seen white men, on Prince Albertland in the Arctic, are Prince Albertland in the Arctic, are given by an officer of the returned rev-enue cutter Thetis, who learned full details from Capt. Klinkenberg of the steam whaler Olga, who located them. Last winter, when his vessel was in the ice, near Prince Albert land, Klinkenberg, accompanied by an Eskimo, started inland on a hunting trip. He went 250 miles in a north-easterly direction over the snow, find-ing traces of people. Other whalers

ing traces of people. Other whalers had also seen traces of natives in this region, but nover sighted them. Capt. Klinkenberg came up with 150 or more. When they saw him, they came toward him, armed with copper knives and bows and arrows. They held these above their heads and he pointed a rifle at them

at the One advanced alone and he laid down his rife, the native putting down his weapons. They became friendly, and by means of signs, Klinkenberg learned by means of signs, Klinkenberg learned that other than an old woman who came from Prince Williamland they had never seen white men previously. He visited the village and found about 600 people, all of whom ilved by hunt-ing and fishing. They used the most primitive utensils, fashloned from bone and fasting.
