A DEADLY PARALLEL.

Two Stories About the Same Thing
Appear Concurrently.

Some time ago a whole mile of engines, on the New York Central tracks, caused no end of rumor. The report gained circulation that these engines being idle told how hard times were. Investigation, however, showed that while these engines were standing idle, new ones were being built to take their place. The idle engines were old decrepits which had been pressed into service during the fall rush. The New York Evening Sun printed two stories which tell the whole story by means of the "deadly parallel." The two dispatches follow:

Elkhart, Ind., May—One mile of idle railroad engines was photographed in the yards of the New York Central lines here yesterday, by orders of the company. The locomotives numbered 120, and represent a cost of nearly \$1,000,000. It is understood that the company proposes to exhibit the photographs in connection with the arguments before the interstate railroad commission and in the conference with the Merchants' association and other organizations that are fighting against increased rates.

Schenectady, N. Y., May—The American Locomotive company's plant in this city is now working on an order for 135 engines for the New York Central to be delivered this summer, to take the place of a large number of engines along the system which are no longer serviceable.
