# LOCK CANAL IS

It Also Represents a Great Saving of Both Time and Money.

SAYS LIEUT. COL. GOETHALS.

Ridicule Predictions of Disaster-Total Cost of Undertaking Now Estimated at \$375,201,000.

Washington, March 16 .- 'A lock canal at Panama, according to the present plan, is plainly the most desirable. Not only this, but it represents a great saving of time and money over the sealevel plan."

Lieut. Col. George M. Goethals, chairman and chief engineer of the isthmian canal commission, thus defends the lock plan of constructing the canal, in a special report to the com-mission made public today. He ridicules the predictions of disaster made by government officials and others, and challenges them to produce arguments to back up their claims.

"This slip," says he, "probably would have passed unnoticed but for the fact that at the time a flood is the Chagres river had attained such proportions as to cover a portion of the Panama rall-road tracks south of Gatun. A newspaper correspondent saw his opportunity for a sensational story, and attributed the flood to the dropping of the Gatun dam into the subtermnean lake under the dam and locks, which another faker previously discovered and the news of the destruction of the dam was cabled to the states."

According to the report, the Gatun dam satisfactorily solves the problem of the conirol of the Chagres, and there should be no doubt in the mind of any one who impartially examines the data, it says, that the solution is not only feasible, but absolutely safe. Reverting to the sea level canal, Col. Goethals says:

"To be sure, the partisans of the sea level type are now proposing to diminale both the Gamba dam and the tidul lock by making the channel so wide as to reduce the currents that tespiain how they propose to control or divert the Chagres, the bed i which will be 50 feet above the water surface of the canal at the juncture. Neither they nor any one else can ofter any figures as to time and cost for the construction of such a canal as they now advocate."

The estimated cost by the present commission for completing the adopted project, excluding the items let out by the board of consulting engineers, is placed at \$227,786,000. If to this be added the estimated cost of sanitation and civil government until the completion of the work, and the \$50,000,000 purchase price, the total cost to the United States of the lock type of capal will amount to \$275,201,000. In the preparation of these estimates there are no unknown facts.

"The estimated cost of the sea level canal for construction alone sams up as \$477.601.000, and it to this be added the cost of sanitation and civil government up to the time of the completion of the canal, which will be at least six years later than the lock canal, and the purchase vel.e, the total cost to the United States will aggregate \$563,000,000"

Concerning the probable effect of earthquakes on the canal, the report states that the last earthquake of any importance in Panama occurred in the seventeenth century, and that existing runs in Panama deponstrate clearly as in Panama demonstrate clearly

ruins in Panama demonstrate clearly that no shocks of any violence could have occurred during the eighteenth or nineteenth centuries.

Col. Goethals concludes:

"I assure you that several years hence, no later than Jan. I, 1915, even the most ardent sea level advocates will, in making the voyage through the canal, admit that the ability to navigate a battleship of a high rate of speed through the lake and wide channel from Gatun to Pedro Miguel faroutweighs the small inconveniences of the safe lockage up to and down from the summit level."
