HUNTING BANK ROBBERS.

The Chinese Trouble—Two Fists Against a Woman—Election Returns.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4.—Secretary Itasca Smith has already been carrying into effect his policy of dispensing with the services of all incompetent clerks in his department, or those appointed purely for political reasons. Under the direction of Chief Clerk Wardie, the individual records of the clerical force of the census office are being thoroughly examined, and all efforts made to detect and remove from the service those who are not fit for their work.
