

JUDGES AT WORK.

The Alleged Election Frauds Brought Up on Motion to Dismiss.

JAMES GRIFIN BEEN ONE YEAR.

Singular Episode in a California Divorce Suit—Motion for a Perpetual Injunction, Etc.

Judge Merritt and Bartlett have had a very busy day—the former with motion, etc., constituting the morning business, and the latter with criminal cases.

In Judge Bartlett's court this morning the leading arguments were made in the case of *Chen, Ann, et al. vs. Chen, Chai, et al.*, begun yesterday afternoon, in which the defendant was indicted for stealing one silver bracelet to George Wilson, of Alameda county, on June 11, 1901.

It was then received the jury about 11 o'clock and the attention they brought is a verdict of acquittal.

THE ALLEGED ELECTION FRAUDS.

The arguments on demurrers to the returns in the case of *Alvord, Edwards, Wm. Edwards, and Percy E. Murray*, in reference to alleged election frauds were to have been made by Judge Henderson and H. C. Henderson, counsel for the defendants, and by Judge Merritt for the prosecution. As to the demurrers to the indictment charging the obtaining of ballots, exemption to return on the grounds, first, that said indictment does not conform to the requirements of the provisions of sections 125 and 131 of the Code of Criminal Procedure of Utah territory inasmuch as it does not set forth the names of the persons charged with the offense, and secondly, that the indictment is defective inasmuch as it does not set forth the names of the persons charged with the offense.

In reference to the indictment charging conspiracy, the same first ground is taken, with this exception, that the parties concerned in the offense are not set forth, and secondly, that the indictment is defective inasmuch as it does not set forth the names of the persons charged with the offense.

When the demurrers were read, Judge Merritt stated that he was not prepared to grant the demurrers, and that the case would be set for trial on the 10th of April.

THE ALLEGED ELECTION FRAUDS.

The motion for a new trial in the case of *James Griffin, et al. vs. The State of Utah*, was granted by Judge Merritt, on the ground that the jury was improperly instructed.

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In the case of *James Griffin, et al. vs. The State of Utah*, the jury was instructed that if the defendant was found guilty, he was to be sentenced to the state prison for a term of not less than one year and not more than five years.
