

# TRACK OF MUD AT FAIR GROUNDS

Harness Event Called Off—Program of Running Races.

## FAST TIME IS IMPOSSIBLE.

One Horse Has Fell But Little Jockeys Escapes Injury—Favories Have Rather Bad Day.

In spite of the rain and the poor condition of the track at the state fair grounds yesterday afternoon the largest crowd of the meet assembled to see the horse races. The program consisted of running events only. The one harness race listed for the day was called off owing to the muddy track.

The large crowd present thoroughly enjoyed the good sport. While fast time was almost an impossibility, the horses got away well and put up some good contests. The betting was lively at times and a great deal of interest was taken in each event.

### ONLY ONE ACCIDENT.

There was one accident, owing to the slippery track, but fortunately no one was injured. It happened in the fourth event when Jockey with little Jockeys Flanders up, fell on the first turn. The animal was on the pro in second place when suddenly he stopped and went down. The jockey fell, but the fall did not stop the crowd, but in a moment the horse was on its feet and Flanders, so small he could hardly be seen, crawled from under the fence and started after the mount, which had been spooked. The jockey at first thought his wrist had been injured but later said he was not hurt at all. A fortunate feature of the mishap was the fact that no horses were coming in the race.

In this event Agnes Mack got the lead and maintained it until the finish. The heavy track not only had the effect of preventing fast times, but the most popular jockey, Agnes Mack, in one and one-third miles nearly ready to drop, far boy held the lead for some distance, but Sardine Spudorius, Hodge and Idaithun, along with Agnes Mack, made the race of it. The last was named rushed by the field and looked like a winner, but the going was too heavy and on the finish Sardine and Spudorius took the front and finished in a dead heat.
